Choose a Location

Growing a successful cut flower garden requires careful planning and execution.

The planning phase is so important for gardening efficiency...and your sanity!

Trust me when I say that your results will be much more positive if you invest time designing and planning your gardening space from the beginning.

Here are four things to consider when choosing a location for your cut flower garden.

# Tips For Choosing A Location



## SUNLIGHT IS KEY

- Most flowers that I grow in my cutting garden need at least six hours of sun a day.
- When planning a garden bed, evaluate your location for adequate sunlight to help ensure a thriving cut garden.
- Choose plants that require s similar amount of sunlight, with some variety for interest.

TEST YOUR SOII

- Choose an area with well-drained and healthy soil that is free from any large root systems.
- Before planting, perform a <u>soil test</u>. This will give you a better understanding of how your soil will perform and what amendments may need to be added like fish compost in the spring and <u>mulched leaves</u> in the fall.

## MEASURE THE SPACE

- For beginners, simplicity is key. Consider a rectangular or squareshaped garden bed, which is easier to manage.
- Avoid overcrowding to prevent competition among plants for vital resources like water and nutrients.







Create a Plan

Choosing where to plant your cut flower seedlings isn't just about aesthetics.

Creating a beatiful and thriving cut flower garden prioritizes purposeful planting.

To ensure continuous blooms, I consider these factors when choosing how to organize the plantings within each garden.



CHOOSE A COLOR SCHEME FOR YOUR GARDEN BED



CONSIDER BLOOM TIME FOR EACH FLOWER

Calculate the Space

Calculating your garden space is important in deciding how many flower seed varieties you can grow.

Do not shop for seeds before knowing how much garden space you have to work with.

Think about the number and type of plants when estimating how much room they will take up in your cut garden.



ALLOW FOR 6-8 INCHES OF SPACE AROUND EACH SEED



PLAN FOR 12-15 INCHES OF SPACE BETWEEN EACH ROW

Design the Layout

A strategic layout paves the way for a flourishing, manageable garden.

Use these tips to design a layout that maximizes your space, minimizes your workload, and keeps your garden bursting with beautiful blooms.

Clearly define the boundaries of your flower garden using edging, stones or fencing.

Take into account the existing landscape features of your garden, such as trees, shrubs, or architectural elements like fences and walls. These elements can serve as backdrops or focal points for your flower beds.

Group flowers with similar water and sunlight requirements together. This makes it easier to care for your garden.

Pick Your Seeds

A wide variety of <u>annuals and</u> <u>perennials</u> make excellent cut flowers, so it's important to select blooms that will work best for your climate and preferences.

Consider the size, shape, color, and scent of each bloom when selecting varieties for cutting. It's also helpful to look at how long each flower lasts after being cut from its stem and if they <u>attract</u> <u>beneficial insects</u> or birds to your garden.

Once you've chosen your favorite varieties of flowers for cutting, you can start preparing your soil and planting.
