About the Choir

From their beginnings in 1978 as a twelve-voice early music ensemble, the University of Alberta Madrigal Singers has grown to a choir of over 40 singers which draws on music from all periods and styles for its repertoire. The choir's membership is comprised of mainly music students but is open to singers from across campus through auditions each September.

The Madrigal Singers perform in Convocation Hall on campus, and at other venues in Edmonton, including the Francis Winspear Centre for Music and various churches. They have sung frequently as guests of the Edmonton Symphony and the Alberta Baroque Ensemble. This season the choir joins the Edmonton Symphony for their annual December performances of Handel's *Messiah*. The CBC frequently records their concerts for either regional or national broadcast. Beyond Edmonton, the choir frequently tours Alberta and British Columbia, and in recent years has participated in *University Voices*, a festival of Canadian university choirs held in Toronto.

The Madrigal Singers have been frequent finalists in the CBC Competition for Amateur Choirs, and won first prize in the Mixed Choir category of this competition on three occasions. International competition successes have included first prizes at the Robert Schumann Competition in Germany in 1995, and the Cork International Competition in Ireland in 1999.

The Madrigal Singers have released three recordings, *Musicians Wrestle Everywhere* (1997), *Balulalow: Anthems, Carols and Lullabies for Christmas (1999)*, which won the National Choral Award from the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors for best Canadian choral recording that year, and the newly-released *My Soul, There is a Country* ... (2001), which features the first recording of British composer Gavin Bryar's *On Photography*, as well as other British and Canadian music. Their fourth recording, *The Passing of the Year*, will be released in late November.

About the Director

A member of the Department of Music faculty since 1981, Leonard Ratzlaff obtained his graduate degrees in choral conducting from University of Iowa, working with Don Moses and Richard Bloesch. His dissertation on Bruckner's *Te Deum* earned him the American Choral Directors Association Julius Herford Dissertation Prize. His duties include teaching and co-supervising the U of A's graduate program in choral conducting, and he has recently been appointed Chair of the Department of Music. In addition to his work with the Madrigal Singers, he directs the Richard Eaton Singers, a symphonic chorus that frequently collaborates with the ESO. He conducted the National Youth Choir of Canada in 2000, and is a past president of the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors. Recent honours include his induction into the City of Edmonton Cultural Hall of Fame, and being awarded the Richard Eaton Choral Award by the Alberta Choral Federation, as well as the Queen's Jubilee Medal for distinguished service to Canadian choral music. He is a frequent clinician and adjudicator across Canada.

About the Choir

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Ranging in age from 14 to 23, Kokopelli is a vibrant and energetic troupe of young singers from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. Founded in 1996, this choir has traveled extensively throughout North America and performed with many outstanding artists over

the years. The choir is known for their unique style of presentation, which combines high quality musical delivery and artistic staging, singing music ranging from canonical classical repertoire to experimental and avant garde contemporary works. Kokopelli has recorded 7 CDs, including a commercial release (on the EMI label) of a collaboration with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and Canadian recording artist Rita MacNeil. The choir is currently producing a DVD that will feature the best moments of the past five years. Kokopelli hosts an active website that includes video, audio and interactive projects.

The choir has been featured at many national music festivals in Canada – they have been the Showcase Choir at the Rocky Mountain National Music Festival for the past seven years and the guest festival choir for MusicFest Canada 2002. The Association of Canadian Choral Conductors' bi-annual conference, Podium, featured Kokopelli in 2000, and the choir is slated to appear again for Podium 2004. Kokopelli has participated in numerous international events. Most recently, the choir toured Denmark, Sweden, and Norway, and represented Canadian choral music at the 2002 International Society of Music Educators Conference in Bergen, Norway. Kokopelli will be participating in a cultural exchange to Namibia and South Africa in July and August 2004 where they will be featured in the National Choral Festival of South Africa, and hosted by the Namibian National Youth Choir and the Pro Cantu Youth Choir. The organization strongly believes in a non-competitive approach to music education, however they have been granted numerous awards for their accomplishments including the 1997 Edmonton Salute to Excellence Award for outstanding accomplishment in the arts. The choir is also the recipient of the National Children's Rights Award 2000 for excellence in the Arts.

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About the Director

Scott Leithead is the founder and artistic director of the Kokopelli Choir Association, the T.I.M.E. Vocal Ensembles and the Brailtones Choir for persons with disabilities. His choirs have been featured at regional, national and international spotlight performances, including the bi-annual conference of the Association of Canadian Choral Conductors, Podium, in 2000 (Edmonton) and 2004 (Winnipeg); the International Society of Music Educators (ISME) Conference 2000 (Edmonton) and 2002 (Bergen, Norway); and the International Association of Jazz Educators Conference 2001 (New York City). His choirs have been featured on 13 CDs over the past seven years, and have had the opportunity to work with many outstanding artists and organizations. Mr Leithead is in frequent demand as clinician, guest conductor and evaluator at events across North America. Recent notable appearances include: evaluator at the University of Washington Choral Festival; director of the Saskatchewan Provincial Honour Choir; director of the Saskatchewan Provincial Honour Jazz Choir; director at the University of Manitoba Summer Jazz Program; director of the Nova Scotia Choral Federation Youth Camp; evaluator at the Ontario Vocal Festival and Brandon Jazz Festival; and director of the 800-voice 2001 IAAF World Track and Field Opening Ceremonies Choir. Mr Leithead has also been invited to conduct the 2004 Nova Scotia and 2006 British Columbia Provincial Honour Choirs. Mr Leithead is the recipient of the Syncrude Award for Innovative Artistic Direction at the 2002 Edmonton Mayor's Awards for Business and the Arts. He is also the recipient of the 2001 Con Spirito Award presented by the Alberta Choral Federation. In 1996, he received the Edmonton Salute to Excellence Award for outstanding educational work with youth.
