Program Notes

Internationally recognized pianist Marek Jablonski was born in Cracow, Poland where he began his musical education at the age of six. A few years later, his family in Canada and he continued his studies which took him to the Banff School of Fine Arts, the Aspen School of Music, and to the Julliard School in New York. At the age of 21, Mr Jablonski returned to Canada to win the Grand Prize in Jeunesse Musicale's first National Music Competition. Shortly thereafter, he made his debut at Carnegie Hall with Zubin Mehta conducting the American Symphony Orchestra, and began extensive tours of Canada and the U.S.

Regularly invited to concertize in Europe, Marek Jablonski has performed in all of the major centres there including Paris, London, Berlin, Vienna, Madrid, Brussels and Milan, the latter two cities hosting complete recital series of the works of Chopin. He has also toured extensively several times in the USSR and South America. In addition to having performed with every orchestra in Canada, Mr Jablonski has collaborated with such conductors as Pierre Monteux and Kiril Kondrashin. He has been a frequent guest on both radio and television in Canada and in Europe.

In the field of pedagogy, Marek Jablonski's linguistic talents (he speaks a number of languages fluently) have enabled him to give masterclasses in many parts of the world. He has recently given classes in Belgium, France and South America, and he also conducts the annual piano masterclass at the Bergamo Festival in Italy. He has been a guest artist at the Banff School of Fine Arts for the past 15 years.

Mr Jablonski has joined the Department of Music at the University of Alberta. He also travels regularly to Toronto where he gives masterclasses for the Royal Conservatory of Music Advanced Performance Programs and to the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.
