In 1976 when Benjamin Britten (1913-1976) composed his final work, the Third Quartet, Op. 94, more than thirty years had elapsed since the creation of his earlier string quartets. During this long and productive interim his major compositions had established him as one of the great masters of the twentieth century. He composed significant music in every form and was heralded as England's finest opera composer since Purcell. Quartet No. 3, Op. 94 was composed for the Amadeus Quartet who first performed the work at the Maltings, Snape, on December 19, 1976, two weeks after the death of the composer. The University of Alberta String Quartet is the first Canadian quartet to perform this work and the first ensemble to play all three quartets in cycle.
