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Larry Cook, the conductor of the Concert Choir, has his Ph.D. in music from the University of Iowa, and has also studied at Hastings College, Syracuse University, and the State Institute for Music in Frankfurt, Germany. He is Chairman of the Division of Choral Music at the University of Alberta where he also conducts the University Madrigal Singers and the Richard Eaton Singers.

The University of Alberta Concert Choir, founded in 1970, is open by audition to all students at the University, and nearly every faculty is represented in the Choir's membership. The Concert Choir sings frequently throughout the University term, collaborates regularly with University Orchestra and Opera productions, and has been featured on numerous radio and television broadcasts. Each year the Choir makes a Spring Tour, performing a wide variety of repertoire ranging from Renaissance motets to contemporary folk song arrangements. Last year the Concert Choir toured England and Germany, giving twelve highly acclaimed concerts in two weeks. The 45-member tour choir is selected from over 90 members of the Concert Choir.
