Program Notes

Prague Spring: This three-movement divertimento for string orchestra was inspired by a trip to Prague in 1997. It depicts three aspects of the city: the resistance to the Soviet invasion of 1968, in a violent and turbulent Toccata; an introspective reflection on the Jewish cemetery, which contains a deeper message of hope; and finally the brighter events of 1989, the "Velvet Revolution", in the dance-like 'Rondeau a la Carte,' which ends in a frenzied coda of much drinking and celebration.

The entire work is formed out of three very simple ideas: the descending whole-tone which then goes back up again (in traditional terms a lower auxiliary note), a group of five notes within the compass of the diminished fifth that can be heard to form out of the first motive, and thirdly, the interval of the descending perfect fourth, which is embedded in the dense and tense opening of the first movement, but which gradually achieves more prominence, notably as the cello/bass ostinato in the second movement, until it is revealed, in the final movement, as the opening of a Czech children's song that forms the 'B' section of a very unusual Rondo. Each re-appearance of the A and B sections in the Rondo is in a different meter, so that in an ABACABA structure the first A section has eight eighth-notes per measure, then the next has seven, then six and finally five. When it reaches five, the magic number of the second motive mentioned above, this triggers the coda, whose resemblance to a certain plainchant melody will almost surely be noted. Regardless, if one is able to distinguish the three basic motives from the outset, this should form an adequate aural roadmap for the events that are to follow.
