Summoning the Earth Spirit To the Ends of the Earth The Radiant Universe

The Eternal Earth, a three movement work for large orchestra, is at once my plea for the continuation of life on earth and a celebration of the joys of the universe.

Vigorous fanfare-like motifs and thunderous percussion effects including lion's roar, gongs, tamtams and Chinese tomtoms characterize the movement which calls forth the dragon spirit from the bowels of the earth. It is the spirit which Okakura in his book **The Awakening of Japan** calls "the spirit of change, therefore of life itself".

To the Ends of the Earth, the second movement, is a tranquil, lyrical cradle-song for our world with tender solo passages for cello, piccolo, harp and céleste. It is meant as a song of solace for the distant, disappearing corners of the world and with them, the ways of life and species of nature which are being lost to us forever. Included in this movement are some exotic instrumental effects: the rubbing of water-filled crystal wine glasses, a shimmering glissando effect on the timpani and a particular "seagull glissando" performed by the cello section at the end of the movement.

The third movement, *The Radiant Universe*, which begins with a recall of the opening fanfare motif, is an affirmation of life and a joyful celebration of the oneness of heaven and earth.

The creation of *The Eternal Earth* was documented in 1986 in a Rhombus Media film produced for the National Film Board of Canada. Immediately following its première the piece was included on the Toronto Symphony's 1986 European tour with Andrew Davis conducting.

The Eternal Earth was commissioned by the Toronto Symphony with the kind assistance of the Canada Council.

Francesca da Rimini (1876) (Fantasia après Dante: Inferno, Canto V) Pyotr Il'yich Tchaikowsky (1840-1893)

In the year in which this work was written the composer was in the depths of a personal crisis from which he never was to escape, brought about by the absolute non-acceptance of his congenital homosexuality in Czarist Russia. He wrote to his brother Modeste, "I have decided to marry. I cannot avoid this. I have to do it, and not just for my own sake but also for you, and for Tolya and for Sasha [his other siblings], and for all those I love." Disaster followed the marriage in 1877 and he remained with his new bride less than three months. His feelings of shame and disgrace were dire, and it is difficult to resist the sense that he indentified with the damnation of Francesca, herself a victim of her own mortal sin: illicit love.

Tchaikowsky's manuscript for his enormous tone poem bears his own prose program note, given in part below.

"Dante, accompanying the shade of Virgil, descends to the second circle of hell's abyss. The air here is filled with groans, wails and cries of depair. In the sepulchral gloom a storm blows up and rages. Furiously the

hellish whirlwind races along, bearing in its wild whirling the spirits of mortals whose reason in life was clouded by amorous passion.... Dante's attention is specially drawn to the two lovely shades of Francesca and Paolo spinning in each other's embrace..... Dissolving in tears, the shade of Francesca tells her sad tale.... '....he, from whom nothing will now separate me, kissed my trembling mouth...'At that moment Francesca's husband entered unexpectedly and killed both her and Paolo with blows from his dagger. And, having said this, Francesca was again borne away in the embrace of Paolo by the furiously and wildly raging whirlwind."

Orchestrally, the work is a tour de force, ranging from the anguished cries of the brass and the despairing gasps of cellos and basses in the introduction, the furious whirlwind of the woodwinds and strings in the Vivace, to the radiant love theme introduced by solo clarinet and expounded by the full orchestra. This melody in itself is worth the rest of the work and must rank as one of the most remarkable and extended of melodic inspirations of the entire Romantic period.
