Newly Discovered Works

by Carl Czerny

with Visiting Artist

Anton Kuerti, piano

The nineteenth-century Austrian composer and teacher, Carl Czerny (1791-1857), has been well known to generations of piano students for his innumerable etudes, studies and technical exercises which have been inflicted on them for almost two centuries. Yet, as the pupil of Beethoven and the teacher of Liszt, he was not only the transmitter of an important pianistic tradition, but an imposing composer in his own right. His pedagogical compositions have so overshadowed his more profound and serious work that much of the latter is only now slowly coming to public attention. These serious compositions presently emerging from obscurity show that Czerny did not lack for invention, craft or emotion, and that he was a genius of musical and pianistic creativity that should not be despised or forgotten.

The University of Alberta's new Canadian Centre for Austrian and Central European Studies, in conjunction with the Department of Music, therefore proposes to mount a "Carl Czerny International Symposium and Music Festival" in the spring of the year 2000. The music festival will feature performances of some of the most important Czerny compositions, many as world premieres from unpublished manuscripts. The Edmonton Symphony Orchestra is planning to schedule an all-Czerny concert as part of this festival.

Pianist Anton Kuerti was born in Austria, grew up in the USA, and has lived in Canada for the last thirty years. His teachers included Arthur Loesser, Mieczyslaw Horszowski and Rudolf Serkin. At the age of 11 he performed the Grieg Concerto with Arthur Fielder, and he was still a student when he won the famous Leventritt Award.

Anton Kuerti has toured 31 countries, including Japan, the USSR, and most European countries, and has performed with most major US orchestras and conductors, such as the New York Philharmonic, National Symhony (Menuhin), Cleveland Orchestra (Szell), Philadelphia Orchestra (Ormandy), and the orchestras of Atlanta, Denver, Detroit, Pittsburgh, St Louis, and San Francisco. His vast repertoire features some 50 concertos, including one he composed himself.

In Canada Kuerti has appeared in 115 communities from coast to coast, and has played with every professional orchestra, including 35 concerts with the Toronto Symphony. His extensive discography includes all the Beethoven Concertos and Sonatas, and a six-CD set of the Schubert Sonatas.
