## School Receives Two Important Donations

The School has been fortunate to receive two very substantial donations totaling \$246,000. Over a period of three successive years beginning in 1994, Dr. Robert E. and Mrs. Gretchen Brundin donated \$21,000 to honour academic achievement and professional potential among students in the MLIS program at the University of Alberta. The first scholarship of \$850. will be awarded to a full-time entering student in 1996. In 1996, Dr. Leslie Muriel Heathcote generously donated \$225,000 to the University of Alberta to establish a new scholarship fund in recognition of academic achievement by students enrolled in the Master of Library and Information Studies program. Two scholarships valued at \$4,500. each will be awarded annually, one to a student entering the full-time MLIS program and the other to a full-time second year student. Two undergraduate awards of \$3,000 each will also be endowed to outstanding students in the Department of English at the University of Alberta who intend to pursue graduate degrees in Library and Information Studies.

The generosity of Dr. Heathcote and the Brundin family to the School and to Alberta librarianship is deeply appreciated by students and faculty and by the library community in the Province.



## Biography - Dr. Lesley Muriel Heathcote

Lesley Muriel Heathcote was the youngest of the seven daughters of Henry and Annie Heathcote. She was born and raised in Edmonton, where her mother insisted that the girls go to school and become educated. Miss Heathcote attended the University of Alberta where she earned a B.A. in Honors French and German in 1924 and an M.A. in Philology (Historic Linguistics) in 1928. The following year she earned a B.S. in Library Science from the University of Washington, where she served as serials librarian for 15 years. In 1945-46, she worked at the International Labour Office in Montreal. She returned west in 1946 to work in the Montana State University (then Montana State College), eventually achieving the position of Professor and Director of Libraries in 1965, retiring in 1970. During her tenure as Director, she oversaw the expansion of the University Library collections from 75,000 to nearly half a million volumes, as well as the construction of two library buildings. Miss Heathcote served as president of the Pacific Northwest Library Association in 1951-52 and of Montana Library Association in 1953-54. In 1969, she was designated Librarian of the Year for Montana and in 1978 she received the Montana State University Blue and Gold Award. She was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from Montana State University in 1981.

In addition to her extensive professional activities and numerous articles in library journals, Dr. Heathcote was a founding member of the Bozeman Symphony Society and served as Secretary from 1968-70. She became a flautist at age 54

and played for the Bozeman Symphony. An active outdoors person, she is a life member of the Alpine Club of Canada.



### **Brundin Scholarship**

The School of Library and Information Studies is pleased to announce the establishment of a new scholarship fund at the University of Alberta, the Robert and Gretchen Brundin Scholarship in Library and Information Studies. Over a period of three successive years beginning with 1994, Dr. Robert E. and Mrs. Gretchen P. Brundin have generously donated \$20,000 to honour academic achievement and professional potential among students in the MLIS program at the UofA. The first Scholarship of \$850 will be awarded to a full-time entering student in 1996.

Dr. Brundin, professor emeritus, taught at the University of Alberta for 21 years and served the profession at large for 36 years, before retirement in 1995. He studied journalism and political science at the University of California and completed the MLS degree in library science and education there in 1959. He earned his PhD in higher education and library science from Stanford University in 1970.

Dr. Brundin's library career began in 1959 with his appointment as a librarian with the San Jose City College Library. In 1963 he was appointed Director of Library Services at the College, a

position he held until 1975. During this time, Dr. Brundin also taught Spanish and Library Science courses at the College.

In 1972-73, Dr. Brundin taught in the School of Library Science at the University of Alberta as a Visiting Associate Professor. He was invited to join the School at the rank of Associate Professor in 1975, and was promoted to Professor in 1980. He retired as professor emeritus in 1995 after 21 years of service to the University and 36 to the profession. Dr. Brundin's teaching and research interests included reference and information services, academic libraries, special collections, library buildings, and history of librarianship.

In honour of the 25th anniversary in 1993-94 of the founding of the library school, Dr. Brundin wrote a history entitled *From Codex to the Computer: Twenty-Five Years of the School of Library and Information Studies*.

In addition to his research activities and extensive involvement in the affairs of the University of Alberta, Dr. Brundin has belonged to several local and national professional associations. He maintains an active interest in the history of Canada, especially the Canadian Arctic. The third edition of his *Books on Canada and the Arctic: A Bibliography and Price Index* is in preparation.

Gretchen P. Brundin has been a high school teacher of home economics and a university lecturer in family studies, and over the years has maintained strong contact with, and interest in, the library school, its students, and faculty. The Brundins have four adult children. In

retirement, they garden, cycle, hike, read, and travel, and Dr. Brundin continues to teach as needed.

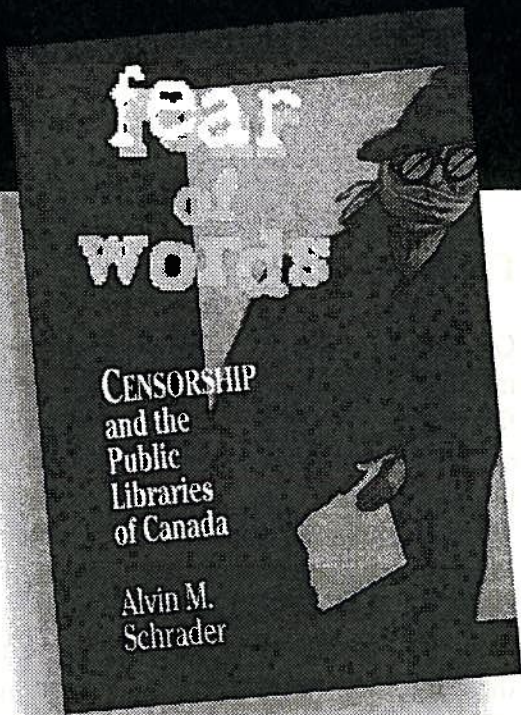
## From the AGM...

On May 31, 1996 after LISAA's business meeting, Dr. Alvin Schrader gave a fascinating talk entitled *Exploring Issues of Censorship*. Dr. Schrader expressed his belief in the value of public debate of ideas and the importance of opposing hate propaganda law in Canada's Criminal Code. A few of his current ideas in the area of censorship relate to the Internet, music, child proofing software, and selective targets for labelling. "Labelling, a cataloguer's nightmare", in Dr. Schrader's words, include the Odeon Theatres "Warning Legend". This legend includes the following labels:

- violent scenes
- brutal violence
- violence, coarse language
- brutal violence & coarse language
- violence & coarse language throughout
- gory violence, coarse language, & sexual content
- coarse language
- coarse language throughout
- language warning

Dr. Schrader went onto to discuss community standards, the sponge theory, and nostalgia syndrome. He closed his talk with the following quotation from an "Afterword" to Margaret Laurence's *The Diviners* written by Timothy Findley:

*Books, like dreams, are essentially private realms. Nothing should be allowed to detract from each person's right to read a book privately and to interpret it freely in the light of what each person has experienced and knows of life.*
