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### WESTERN CANADA AND THE CANADA—U.S. FREE TRADE AGREEMENT (1988-93)

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### THE FTA EXPERIENCE FROM 1988-93: AGGREGATE VALUES

This Report summarizes the results in aggregate for the 1988-93 period, and then provides more detailed information about export trade at the two digit HS code level for each of the western provinces.

Tables 1 and 2 provide aggregate information on the value of western Canadian exports for the region as a whole, and for each of the four provinces. Table 1 reveals that aggregate merchandise exports from Western Canada rose to \$48.12 billion in 1993. This compares with export values of \$39.11 billion in 1988, an increase of 23.0%. The increase in export values over 1992 was 9.1%. In 1993 exports from Alberta rose to \$19.69 billion, some \$0.7 billion higher than shipments from British

Columbia. Totals are also shown for exports excluding the grains category (HS10) which are particularly significant to the three prairie provinces and largely go to non-US markets. Poor grain supplies for export from Western Canadian producers actually reduced the total value of exports in 1993 from 1992 levels for Saskatchewan and contributed to the extremely small increase recorded for Manitoba. In the case of Alberta, however, export values in 1993 (ex HS10) amounted to \$18.77 billion, an increase of some \$2.18 billion over 1992. Shifting spatial export markets are evident for the region as a whole and for each of the provinces with US market share continuing to increase for all provinces in 1993.

Table 2 shows the percentage growth from 1988 to 1993, as well as the growth from 1991 to 1992 and from 1992 to 1993 in the value of (a) total exports, (b) exports to the US market, and (c) exports to non-US markets. Shipments to the United States between 1988 and 1993 grew from a high of some 77% (or 11.1% per year compounded) in the case of Alberta down to 34% (5.9% per year compounded) for British Columbia. Double digit percentage increases for 1992-93 were again recorded in shipments to the US market from the region as a whole and each of the four provinces, a record similar to that in 1991-92. These percentage increases in 1992-93

were about 1-2 percentage points lower than those recorded for 1991-92.

The decline in shipments to non-US markets over the five year period, and in particular for 1992-3, is evident in all four provinces. For the three prairie provinces it is almost entirely attributable, as suggested above, to the fall in HS10 exports which fell by \$1.87 billion in 1993 compared with the previous year, a decline which largely explains the changes recorded over the 1988-93 period. But it is clear that all four western provinces experienced export growth over the five years only because of increased shipments to the US market.

The appendix contains the value of total exports, exports to the US market, and exports to the rest of the world for the western provinces in the 1988-93 period at the two-digit HS level, categories 01 to 99. The Appendix also shows shipments to the US as a market share of total shipments for the respective years 1988 and 1993

in each of these categories. Table 3 below extracts from the Appendix selected value and market share data for each of the provinces to round out the growth figures shown in Tables 1 and 2. The table serves as a point of departure for an examination of each HS two digit category.

### COMMODITY EXPORTS TO THE U.S. MARKET BY TWO-DIGIT HS CODE

Table 3 in column (1) records by province the numbers of HS categories (with exports of \$10 million or greater in 1993) showing an increase in export values over the 1988-93 period that also displayed an increase in 1993 over the level recorded in 1992. Effectively, these are categories where there is evidence of a sustained increase. These categories numbered 23, 21, 13, and 11 respectively for Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan. Column (2) lists those categories meeting the

specified conditions where US market shares were .90 or greater in 1988. In column (3) are listed those HS classes where shipment values exceeded \$10 million in 1993 and where there was an increase in US market share of exports.

Table 4 shows the sum of the increase in 1993 exports over those recorded in 1988 for categories in columns (1), (2), and (3). The table indicates that for the region as a whole the total increase between 1988 and 1993 across the region for those HS categories whose export

values amounted \$13.39 billion. Some 45% of this increase in the value of shipments came from HS classes in which the US market share in 1988 was at least 90%, and just over 85% came from shipments in HS categories in which there

was an increase in US market share irrespective of initial market positioning. This indicates that in a good many individual export categories producers are responding to the potential of the US market.

### PRICE CHANGE VS VOLUME CHANGE

In comparing the change in export values in 1993 with those in 1992 some comment on the price vs. volume question should be offered within the limitations of existing price data. There are no price indexes specifically applicable to a province's exports, nor does Statistics Canada publish indexes of export prices for HS categories. Application of published indexes of manufactured exports to categories such as HS37, 84, 85, 87, 90, and 94 is extremely problematical, if not simply inappropriate. However, for some raw materials (crude oil, natural gas, wheat) and commodity grade exports (sawn lumber) inferences may be drawn from available export price data. Selected comments follow.

There is obvious interest in sawn lumber, crude oil and natural gas (HS27 and 44) which in 1993 together accounted for very nearly one-half of the value of exports from Western Canada. During 1993 HS44 (sawn lumber and articles thereof) exports from British Columbia rose by just over \$2 billion over 1992 levels, or by 36%. It is well known that most of this category represents shipments of construction lumber. Between 1992 and 1993 the export price index applicable to Canadian exports of sawn lumber

and products rose by 34% (Statistics Canada Cat 65-001), which leads to the inference that what this increase records is overwhelmingly a price rather than a volume effect.

During 1993 shipments of crude oil and natural gas from Alberta to the US market increased in value by just under \$1.8 billion or by 16%. The export price index for crude oil fell by 7% and the natural gas price index rose by 12%. This indicates that the majority of the increase in 1993 was in shipment volume.

In 1993, as previously mentioned, HS10 exports from Western Canada declined by almost \$1.9 billion, while the grain export price indexes last year were higher than in 1992 (wheat 19%, barley 1%, canola 6%). The strengthening of prices simply dramatizes the decline in shipment volumes that occurred.

Since 1988 the value of livestock shipments from Western Canada has risen almost two and one half times. The increase from 1992 to 1993 was just over 12%. However, the monthly average national export index of livestock prices rose by 15.6% during 1993 which indicates that the increased value of shipments this past year is really accounted for by the price affect.

### SOME NOTABLE CHANGES IN PROVINCIAL EXPORT LEVELS AND THEIR COMPOSITION

### OIL AND GAS

The period since 1988 has seen substantial growth in the value of Alberta exports such that the province in 1993 became the largest provincial exporter in Western Canada. This growth, as was predicted prior to the passage of the FTA, continues to be driven in large measure

by the oil and gas sector for which access to the US market is of such great importance. The growth in shipments from HS27 is summarized below in Table 5 which reveals that the value of gas shipments has just about doubled since 1988, and now by a sizeable margin exceeds in value shipments of crude oil.

Manitoba and Saskatchewan have also seen strong export gains under HS27 as shown below in Tables 6 and 7. Unlike Alberta, these provinces have relied on oil exports for a significant share of the increase. Manitoba's exports of electrical energy (HS2716) are also a notable feature of Table 6. Another category showing a sharp increase for Saskatchewan

includes inorganic chemicals and precious metals (HS28). Since 1988 the export price index for inorganic chemicals has increased by 7% while the index for precious metals has fallen some 16%. Consequently the bulk of the growth in this category can be attributed to increased shipments (see below, Table 7).

### WOOD PRODUCTS

Turning now to the wood products categories of HS44, 47 and 48, exports from Alberta in 1993 amounted in total to \$716.3 million, an increase of 15.1% over the 1988-93 period. Of the \$716.3 million shipped in 1993 some 54%, or \$386.5 million, was accounted for by shipments of woodpulp (HS47). This compares with woodpulp exports of \$385.5 million in 1988. The wood products groups have had significant differences in export price experience since 1988. Based on national indexes woodpulp export prices declined by 30% between 1988 and 1993 which suggests that export volumes must have risen by approximately two-fifths in order to maintain shipment values. Table 8 below provides data on selected four digit HS categories for HS 44 and 48. There is a strong growth in particle board exports most of which go to the US market. The national export index of paperboard prices has changed little since 1988, so it can be inferred that a volume increase occurred.

The composition of the HS48 exports is highly varied from cartons, boxes and packing

materials through pads and binders to paperboard with no one particular product dominant.

British Columbia's performance in the wood products category is also of interest. Unlike Alberta, British Columbia was unable to maintain shipment values in pulp from 1988 to 1993. Table 9 below shows export highlights for HS44 and 47. As mentioned earlier, the huge jump in HS44, is largely a result of price increases.

### PROCESSED MEATS, LIVESTOCK, AND OTHER AGRICULTURAL EXPORTS

The growth in Alberta's HS02 exports is among the strongest recorded. In value terms this category of exports has grown steadily from \$158.9 million in 1988 to \$442.4 million in 1993. The aggregate results and those for selected three digit categories are summarized below in Table 10. The national export price index for meat and meat preparations increased by approximately 64% between 1988 and 1993. This would imply that export volumes rose by about 70% over the comparable period.

Meat and livestock exports from the other western provinces did not perform as well as Alberta's. Although Manitoba and Saskatchewan did post sizeable increases in the livestock export category through the 1988-93 period, gains in 1992-93 were, as indicated above, largely a result of price changes. Tables 11 and 12 display the growth in livestock exports for both provinces since 1988. Even when the export price index gain of 33% for the 1988-93 period is considered, both provinces still

have striking export records.

The gains made in meat and livestock export values offset to a small degree the effect of the dramatic decline in shipment volumes for grains (HS10). Positive results in Saskatchewan's agricultural sector are also reflected by strong growth of exports in the vegetable category (HS07). Export values here rose \$86 million or 560%, from \$15 million in 1988 to \$99 million in 1993.

SELECTED HIGHER VALUE ADDED EXPORTS

For Alberta we have included in this group four HS categories:, 84, 85, 90 and 94. Between 1988 and 1993 the total value of Alberta exports for these four classes rose from \$352.9 to \$1,001.2

million, an increase of \$648.3 million or 183%. Selected product exports at the four digit level are reported in Tables 13 and 15 below. Table 13 contains information on HS84 and 85 and Table 15 reports on HS90 and 94.

The experience of Alberta with respect to increased exports from Western Canada within HS84 and 85 is not unique to this province but has been experienced also by British Columbia where rates of increase approximate those in Alberta. Table 14 shows the comparative sample from British Columbia. In both provinces access to the US market has obviously been important, particularly for HS85 in the case of Alberta with about 70% of shipments going there. US market share has increased slightly since 1988.

The summary for Alberta shipments in HS90 and 94 is contained in Table 15. The value of exports from Alberta in these two categories increased from \$67.1 million in 1988 to \$202.5 million in 1993, an increase of 261%. The Alberta growth performance in these two categories exceeds that of other western provinces. Slightly more than one-third of HS90 and somewhat more than four fifths of HS94 exports go to the U.S. market.

Price/volume comparisons employing the prevailing national export price indexes are extremely tenuous for these higher value added categories. The national export price index for industrial machinery rose by 17% between 1988 and 1993 which suggests that the substantial portion of the increases observed are real rather than nominal.

British Columbia also managed a strong export performance in HS90. Table 16 below shows exports in that class and provides a look at the remarkable export growth spinning off the still nascent film industry, HS37. Though still a relatively small percentage of British Columbia's exports, the increases in HS37 are particularly encouraging. They underscore the tremendous potential for new sectors to spring up within a province over a very short period of time. The

emerging competitiveness of western Canada's value-added manufacturers will certainly help nurture other new industries.

Though somewhat less successful then their western neighbours, Manitoba and Saskatchewan also have value-added categories helping with their export totals. In the case of Manitoba, HS87 (vehicles) has grown from \$196.5 million in 1988 to \$341.6 million in 1993. Like Alberta and British Columbia, Saskatchewan has seen the value of its machinery exports increase substantially. As shown in Table 18 below, shipment values in category HS 84 increased by close to 100% between 1988 and 1993. Manitoba's performance in HS87 is contained below in Table 17.

### CONCLUSION

The preceding analysis of selected highlights was based upon an examination of export data at the two-digit and four-digit HS level. Western Canada's export performance under the FTA remains encouraging. A review of the performance of exports in each HS category makes it clear that the structural changes realized as a result of the FTA are becoming

more pronounced. The slow recovery of the U.S. economy should see more western Canadian exporters take advantage of the access they have gained since 1988. The NAFTA may give these very positive trends some new characteristics in the next few years. Further monitoring remains appropriate.
