Food Insecurity

Food insecurity is the limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe foods or limited or uncertain ability to acquire acceptable foods in socially acceptable ways.

United States Department of Agriculture

Food Security

Availability: Sufficient food for all people at all times.

Accessibility: Physical and economic access to food for all at all times.

Adequacy: Access to food that is nutritious and safe, and produced in environmentally sustainable ways.

Acceptability: Access to culturally acceptable food, which is produced and obtained in ways that do not compromise people's dignity, self-respect or human rights.

Agency: The policies and processes that enable the achievement of food security

Food Bank

- Collecting, storing ,and distributing food donations
- Short term and emergency relief
- Act as a reference centre

Community Meals

• Pre-made hot meals eaten together

- May also provide other services
- Also provide shelter



Community Gardens

- Space and opportunity to grow food
- May be for the gardener themselves or for the community
- Fosters community
- Encourages healthy eating

Community Kitchens

- People come together to make food
- Share knowledge
- Save time and money

Meal Delivery

- Deliver hot or easy to prepare meals to the homes of those who need it
- Mental and physical wellbeing
