Continue the Experience The Library and Information Studies Alumni Association was formally organized in 1986 to promote and support the goals of the School of Library and Information Studies. HONOURARY MEMBERSHIP IN LISAA 1995

John G. Wright and Shirley Ellison Wright were awarded Honourary Memberships in LISAA at the Annual General Meeting on May 12, 1995.

Shirley Wright completed her BA in English and Spanish at UBC and received Masters of Librarianship from the University of Washington.

She began her professional career as a children's librarian at the Seattle Public Library then moved onto the New Westminister Public Library where she was head of the Children's Department from 1955 to 1969. She was then appointed Deputy Chief Librarian, a position she held from 1966 to 1969

Shirley Wright joined the School of Library and Information Studies as a visiting associate professor in 1969. She stayed with the School and was Assistant Dean from 1977 to 1979, and a Professor from 1979 until her retirement in 1987.

While at the School Shirley Wright taught courses in children's services and public library services.

Her research covered the role of public library trustees, images of Canada

library trustees, images of Canada and the family in Canadian literature for children and young adults. She the author of numerous publications, several in the area of children's literature and library services. She received the Frances E. Russell Award for Research in Canadian Literature, Canadian Chapter, International Board on Books for Young People in 1983. Mrs. Wright was the Canadian consultant for the H.W. Wilson's children's catalogue from 1965-1976.

Mrs. Wright is well known for her work with professional associations. She has served on numerous committees for the Canadian Library Association, the Canadian Association of Children's Libraries, and the Canadian Association of Public Libraries. Shirley Wright was instrumental in setting up LISAA, and was a strong advocate for the establishment of our scholarship.

She is also well known for her local volunteer work. She has been very active in daycare in Edmonton and was a founding member of the University and Community Daycare Centre, and was appointed to the community and family services advisory committee in 1993. She received the City of Edmonton's Salute to Excellence Citation Award in 1993 for her volunteer contributions to the City. These awards are presented by the Mayor and Council to recognize outstanding long term volunteer services. Shirley Wright continues to be active in both volunteer work, and the United Church, and is a strong supporter of the School and LISAA.

John G. Wright completed his B.Ed. in English and History at the University of Saskatchewan. He completed his M.S. and began course work in the PhD program at Columbia University.

Mr. Wright began his career as a School Librarian in Saskatchewan, and became Supervisor of School Libraries from 1963 to 1968 at the Curriculum Branch of the Saskatchewan Dept of Education in Regina.

Mr. Wright joined the School of Library and Information Studies as an Associate Professor in July 1968. He was appointed Professor in July of 1979, and was Dean of the School from July 1984 to June 1987. He retired in 1987,

but continued to teach as a sessional in the School Library Program at the Faculty of Education.

While at the School Mr. Wright taught in the areas of the school librarianship, children's literature, young adult literature, learning materials, and libraries and society. He has numerous publications in the areas of school librarianship, children's literature, and professional education for librarianship.

Mr. Wright is the recipient of many honours including the Governor General's Bronze Medal in 1947, Saskatchewan Teacher's Federation Scholarship in 1950, Saskatchewan Library Advisory Council Scholarship in 1956, Beta PHI Mu 1958, George Virgil Fuller Award for qualifying examinations and dissertation proposal at Columbia University in 1973, the Margaret C. Scoot Merit Award from the Canadian School Library Association in 1976, and the Laurence G. Wiedrick Award of Excellence from the Learning Resources Council of the Alberta Teacher's Association in 1984.

Mr. Wright has been very active in his work with professional organizations, holding a number of positions with the Canadian Library Association, the Canadian School Library Association, the America Library Association, the Canadian Association of Library Schools, the Library Association of Alberta, International Association of School Librarians, International Board on Books for Young People, Canadian Chapter.

Mr. Wright has been a great supporter of the School and LISAA.

1994 SLIS PLACEMENT SURVEY Summary

In 1994, 28 students graduated with Master of Library and Information Studies degree from the University of Alberta. A total of 27 graduates responded to this, our seventh annual survey, for a response rate of 71% (80% the previous year). The survey was conducted in May 1995 with follow-up in June, some 13-14 months after graduation from the MLIS program.

Among the 1994 graduates who participated in the survey, 85% found positions in library and information services. But, while the job market for them might be described as cautiously optimistic, in contrast to earlier years 1994 graduates took longer to find work, secured fewer permanent placements, and relied more on word of mouth and personal contacts for job information. Half of the graduates found placements in public and post secondary libraries, a decline from previous years; among other placements were government libraries, business libraries, and the libraries of non-profit organizations.

The average salary reported by 1994 graduate employed in full-time positions was \$29,807 per year. The majority of graduates found placements in Alberta, half remaining in Edmonton after graduation. Most graduates (employed or not) reported having library work experience by the time they graduated from the MLIS program.

The Ex Libris Association is open to all who have been or still are active in the library world, and to others interested in library history, archives, publishing, and related fields.

The Association provides an opportunity for retired members to continue intellectual and social contacts with fellow members and colleagues. Recent annual meetings/get-togethers have featured Canadian authors, like Jean Little, discussing their recent books, and speakers, like William Poole, Director of the Mackenzie Huntingdon Printing Museum, on aspects of publishing and library history. The get-togethers enable members to renew acquaintances and to stay in touch at the informal lunches.

Reports on the presentations at the get-togethers appear in the twice-yearly newsletter, Ex Libris News. Memoirs and newsnotes about former classmates and colleagues are other popular sections in the newsletter.

Association members try to keep the history of the profession alive by identifying, collecting, organizing, and preserving documents related to library history in Canada. A major long-term project has been to initiate and publish the early history of the Canadian Library Association and a tribute to Elizabeth H. Morton. The Morton Years: The Canadian Library Association, 1946 to 1971 is expected to be published in 1995.
