NEWS FROM THE FACULTY.....

AMERICAN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION - COMMITTEE ON ACCREDITATION

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Every seven years, graduate library education programs in North America undergo the full COA re-accreditation process. In the intervening years, continual accreditation is granted based on annual reports filed with COA.

The Faculty of Library and Information Studies at the U of A is due for its regular seventh year site visit in March 1992 which means that the Self-Study Report is due in Chicago by Fall, 1991. The Steering Committee for the reporting process has Ila Scott as a member, representing LISAA. Each of six sub-committees also has a LISAA representative as follows:

Goals & Objectives - Susan Fahy Curriculum - Josie Tong Faculty - Barbara Bulat Students - Alison Nussbaumer Governance - Kathleen DeLong Resources & Facilities - Christine Andrews This is a normal, routine process that all graduate library education accredited programs undergo every seven years.

The accreditation process is based on the 1972 Standards for Accreditation. The first Standard deals with the goals and objectives developed by the individual program. The Self-Study Report questions are then based on how the remaining five standards reflect these stated goals and objectives.

A major change expected in the upcoming revision to the 1972 Standards is the additional requirement for a Faculty mission statement. The Standards require that the program goals and objectives be widely disseminated. We are therefore taking this opportunity to provide the alumni with a copy of the recently revised Goals and Objectives along with our new Mission Statement. Also enclosed is a sheet with two questions from the Self-Study which need input from our graduates. Please take a few minutes to send us your response. A broad range and number of responses will be most meaningful to our Self-Study. Additionally, we at the Faculty are very interested in what you are doing and how the MLIS program could be improved. The Faculty is planning to start an alumni/ae business card bulletin board. We are asking that you send us your business card to post on the board. The cards will serve to inform students where our graduates are employed. RECRUITMENT....

For a wide variety of reasons, we had a number of withdrawals between August 1 and the first day of classes this year. therefore have a very small first year class for 1990-1991. We were not the only University of Alberta faculty so affected; in a year when emphasis was put on increasing graduate student enrolment, the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research reported a 2.6% decrease in full time enrolment. On the other hand, we have a very large full time second year class so our FTE (full time equivalent) enrollment remains almost the same as last year. We will have room for a large entering class in September 1991. A brochure about the Faculty is enclosed which we would like you to post or give to anyone whom you think could contribute to and would enjoy your profession. Please encourage them to apply to the MLIS program this year.

Faculty of Library and Information Studies

Mission Statement

<u>Education</u>

To prepare individuals for positions of responsibility in the profession of library and information service.

Scholarship

To carry out scholarly study and research that advances the discipline of library and information studies.

Service

To serve as a resource for libraries and information agencies, for their personnel, and for professional associations.

Goals of the MLIS Program

To provide the knowledge, understanding, and skills sufficient for the practice of library and information service at a basic professional level, including the foundation on which further competence and specialization may be built.

To examine the cultural and informational role in society of library and information services.

To emphasize, where appropriate, the Canadian geographic, cultural, social, and governmental context in which libraries and information agencies operate.

To stress the professional obligation to keep informed of social and technological developments, with particular emphasis on Canadian issues.

Objectives of the MLIS Program

Upon completion of the program:

Students will be familiar with the history, the philosophy, and the service orientation of libraries and librarianship.

Students will have an understanding of concepts of knowledge and concepts of information and of the methods of preservation and transmission of cultural records.

Students will be aware of the responsibility of librarians and information specialists with respect to the free flow of ideas and access to information.

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Objectives of the MLIS Program
Continued

Students will have an understanding of the functions of librarians and information specialists within the larger societal framework, and of the factors influencing the creation, dissemination, and use of knowledge and information.

Students will be knowledgeable about basic principles of selection, acquisition, organization, storage, retrieval, and use of recorded knowledge and information resources of all kinds.

Students will be knowledgeable about the theories and concepts of administration and organizational behaviour and their application to the management of libraries and information agencies.

Students will possess the skills necessary to evaluate library and information systems and services.

Students will have an understanding of the principles of systems analysis and systems design for libraries and information agencies.

Students will understand current information technology as an integral part of the operations and services of libraries and information agencies.


Students will be able to evaluate published research in library and information studies and to apply basic principles and techniques of research in library and information studies.

Students will be aware of the links between library and information studies and other disciplines, including shared methodologies and common concerns.

Students will understand the importance of cooperation among libraries and information agencies and of the development and maintenance of collegial relationships with their fellow professionals.

Students will be aware of the need for continuing professional education and be ready to play an active role in associations and engage in other professional activities.
