Business Analysis is the practice of enabling change in an organizational context, by defining needs and recommending solutions that deliver value to stakeholders

-Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (BABOK)




Business Analysis in Brief...

- 4-frame model: people, processes, information, technology
- Distinct from project management, systems analysis, development/engineering, U/X etc. but overlaps with all
- Requires that problems/opportunities be clearly defined before a project starts
- Helps avoid "solution bias" and making assumptions
- Helps ensure that the *right* solutions are implemented for the organization, users, etc.

Key Terms


- **Solution**: A specific way of satisfying one or more needs in a context
- **Design**: A usable representation of a solution
- **Need**: A problem or opportunity of strategic or tactical importance to be addressed
- Requirement: A usable representation of a need
- Change: The act of transformation in response to a need
- **Risk**: the effect of uncertainty on the value of a change, a solution, or the enterprise
- **Stakeholder**: A group or individual with a relationship to the change, the need, or the solution.

- Complementary roles but some key differences...
- BA focus: *building* the solution. PM focus: *delivering* the project on budget, on time, etc. <u>Ideally, projects would have both roles</u>
- PM is more about the "project" whereas BA is more about the "product"
- BA can typically start much earlier (identifying needs, defining the problem/opportunity, planning, gathering requirements, designing prototypes, etc.)
