### SLIS ADMISSIONS UPDATE

Last year, 2002, the School got a surprisingly large number of applications for admission—142 in total compared to 81 in 2001. While applications have been increasing steadily over the last five years, this was an unprecedented leap, and we wondered whether 2003 would see the same sort of jump. It has. At the end of February 2003 we had 109 applications for admission for 2003/2004. Last year 80 applications had come in by the end of February. Best of all, a large number of these applications are strong ones, with high grades, very supportive references, and good evidence of professional potential. We are delighted by this surge of interest in our MLIS program, and only wish we had more room and faculty to take full advantage of it!

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### LAA ANNOUNCES 2003 PRIZE WINNERS

Every year the Library Association of Alberta awards two prizes to graduating MLIS students on the basis of outstanding performance as a student, academic merit and an indication of potential contribution to the library profession. Fellow students and faculty members nominate eligible candidates for this award. This year's winners were announced by LAA Past-President, Rick Leech, at the School's Professional Development Day, February 7, 2003. The winners are Darcy Gullacher and Sandra Anderson.

Darcy Gullacher was born and raised in Calgary, Alberta, and resided there until moving to Edmonton in May 1999. He is a graduating student in the MLIS program at the University of Alberta, and also holds a BA (Religion) from Rocky Mountain College in Calgary, and a BA (History) from The King's University College in Edmonton.

Darcy was inspired to pursue librarianship as a career while employed as the Assistant to the Librarian at Rocky Mountain College for two years after graduating from the college in 1997. Throughout his time as a student in Edmonton he has been employed in the library at The King's University College. Beyond his work commitments, he was also involved in both the Partner's Week Committee and the CLA Student Chapter while at the School of Library and Information Studies.

Darcy is particularly interested is theological librarianship, and is looking forward to pursuing a MA in Theology in the near future, when he is not busy cycling or cross country skiing.

Sandra Anderson is a graduating student in the School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alberta. She holds an undergraduate degree in English Literature with a minor in Comparative Religious Studies.

Sandra is the Chair and Webmaster of the CLA Student Chapter and was also one of the organizers of a local student writing competition at the school. She has also been the webmaster of the Jobs Committee web site and was responsible for a redesign of that site in 2002.

For the past two years, Sandra has been a pioneer with the University of Alberta's Virtual Reference service. She has also worked as a graduate assistant, a research assistant, and a reference librarian. Sandra volunteers her spare time with the Internet Public Library, which is based in Michigan, and has trained many SLIS students as volunteer reference librarians with that organization.

Sandra's passion for libraries actually springs out of the ALC conference she attended in 2001. She attended a session on GATS (General Agreement on Trade in Services) and how the agreement may affect libraries and was inspired to become a librarian and a library advocate. Subsequently, she has created a web resource for librarians about GATS and is working to produce other material about this topic.

Both winners will be honored at the Alberta Library Conference in Jasper, which they are sponsored to attend as part of their prize.

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### PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPKENT DAY 2003 A HIT

The School of Library and Information Studies held its annual Professional Day on February 7<sup>th</sup>. The event is an opportunity for librarians and MLIS students to network and hear from members of the library community about various issues of interest.





The keynote speaker this year was Cate McNeeley, Deputy Chief Librarian of Richmond Public Library and Adjunct Professor at UBC's School of Library, Archival and Information Studies. Cate gave a fascinating presentation on the Ironwood Branch of Richmond Public Library and its approach to harnessing technology and automation so that staff can have more freedom to serve their patrons. Ironwood Branch serves a particularly diverse community and offers self-checkout services in Chinese as well as English. Cate's experience in developing the so-called "Library of the Future" has made her a sought-after speaker across North America.

Other speakers at PD Day included Punch Jackson, Director of Strategic Information and Libraries Branch, Alberta Community Development, and Linda Goyette, a journalist and historian who is writing a book in honour of Edmonton's upcoming centennial. As well, three current or recent SLIS students gave presentations on their research interests.

Coffee breaks and a wonderful selection of door prizes were provided by generous sponsors, including local libraries and bookstores as well as national publishers and library organizations. Professional Development Day wound up with a reception sponsored by LISAA and a poster session of student's work.

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### GAIL DE VOS RECEIVES TEACHING AWARD

The School of Library and Information Studies is excited and pleased to report that once again, an instructor at SLIS has been awarded one of the prestigious teaching awards from the Faculty of Education. This time it was in the outstanding sessional undergraduate teaching category and the award was given to Gail de Vos.

Gail de Vos received her MLS degree in 1988 and has developed a career as a freelance writer and storyteller. She began teaching classes for the School in 1990 and since that time has taught 1,027 undergraduate students in 44 courses. Her gift for teaching has more recently benefited students in BEd programs in Grande Prairie and Red Deer, as well as students enrolled in distance learning for teacher librarians.

Gail developed and taught for the first time in 2001 a distance delivery course on Comic Books and Graphic Novels. The course was featured in the *Chronicle of Higher Learning Education* and on the front page of the *Edmonton Journal*, as the first such course in North America, breaking new ground in exciting ways. Gail teaches Canadian Children's literature for Young People, which she recently modified to emphasize Aboriginal literature for the Blue Quills program, offered through the Faculty of Education.

For many undergraduate students, Gail's courses are their first exposure to the School and what it offers. She has inspired many of them to fix their sights on an MLIS degree.

Gail believes that true learning results from active thinking; that relevant and enjoyable learning is a process of students making connections between their experiences and the subject matter and formulating new insights, explanations, skills and self-awareness. Students respond to her approach, and over and over, they use superlatives to describe the quality of their experiences in Gail's courses. The School considers Gail one of its most valued instructors so valuable in fact, that she was appointed Adjunct Professor several years ago and continues to hold that distinction. She contributes a great deal to our reputation for excellent teaching and for that she is richly deserving of the honour of this teaching award.

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
