ANTONI SZALOWSKI, contemporary Polish composer was born in Warsaw in 1907. He graduated from the Polish National Conservatory of Music in 1930 and shortly thereafter left for Paris where he continue his studies in composition with Nadia Boulanger until 1936.

The mastery of form and the exceptional clarity of his musical content have been widely recognized. This is evidenced by the numerous performances of his works given throughout Europe and America. His compositions have been included in programs of the International Society of Contemporary Music in Warsaw (1939) and New York (1941). At the Paris International Exposition in 1937 Szalowski received the "Medaille d'Or" for his symphonic work, L'Ouverture.

RED DAWN (1977). This piece was inspired by a brief scene from the Spanish film "THE SPIRIT OF THE BEEHIVE." The film is set in the countryside just after the Spanish Civil War, and portrays the experiences and fantasies of a young girl after seeing a Frankenstein film. In this scene, the sun rises on a chill November morning, etching the bare twigs and brown hills with outlines of deep red."

JIM HISCOTT was born in St. Catherines, Ontario, in 1948. After completing a Masters Degree in Physics he began musical studies in 1970 with Dr. Samuel Dolin in Toronto. Between 1973 and 1976 he attended York University, and since 1977 has worked as a music producer with the CBC. He has been a resident of Edmonton since January 1979.
