

SCHOOL EXPERIENCES DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC FOR POST-SECONDARY STUDENTS WITH LD

RESEARCH BRIEF

During the Fall 2020 semester, post-secondary students' with and without learning disabilities (LD) completed our survey regarding their school experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic. Thank you to the 283 individuals who participated, and thank you to SSHRC for funding our research! Some preliminary results are presented here.

Students with learning disabilities are "A LOT more concerned" about...

Accessing services on campus that support their learning needs







Receiving in-class accommodations

Receiving exam accommodations

Instructor being less able to accommodate their learning

When thinking about a particular course they were taking...

- ... students with LD felt more anxious in their course than their peers without LD.
- ... students with LD were more likely to feel there was too much work to do in their course compared to their peers without LD.
- ... students with LD rated "I feel I can be successful in this course" lower than their peers without LD.

Quotes from Students with LD

"There were definitely new challenges and whatnot but it wasn't as bad as I thought it was gonna be."

"I like being able to control my learning environment which has been kind of a god-send. I'm not ever nervous that I'm asking a question in class cuz I'm just typing it in a chat." "It's kind of been a nightmare. My accommodations aren't being met because I don't get a reader and things have been kind of crazy."

"It's been a bit of a rollercoaster. There's been a lot of learning and re-learning in terms of how to navigate the academic world online and doing so in a way where you can support yourself."
