Alvin M. Schrader, New SLIS Director

Larry Beauchamp, Dean, Faculty of Education of the University of Alberta, announces the appointment of Professor Alvin M. Schrader as Director of the School of Library and Information Studies, to a 5-year term, beginning on July 1st, 1997 - June 30, 2002. Currently serving as Acting Director, he brings to the position an extensive and varied background in the theory and practice of library and information studies.

Professor Schrader's major area of research and publication is intellectual freedom and censorship in public and school libraries. His most recent work is Fear of Words, published in 1995 by the Canadian Library Association. His current research focus is on Internet censorship and access issues. Other long time scholarly interests are the philosophical foundations of library and information studies, professional education, bibliometrics and inquiry methodology.

Alvin Schrader received his B.A. (Honours) from the University of Alberta in 1968, an M.A. from Carleton University in 1972, his M.L.S. from the University of Toronto in 1975, and his Ph.D. in Library and Information Science from Indiana University (Bloomington) in 1983. He joined the School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alberta in 1982 while completing his doctoral dissertation.

Prior to his academic career, he worked for two years, 1977 to 1979, for the City of Brampton Public Library and Art Gallery as deputy head of the Chinguacousy Resource Branch responsible for reference services and system-wide performance measurement. From 1975 to 1976, he was information resources consultant with the Torontobased Council of Ministers of Education (Canada). In a previous life his work experience was with the Ontraio public service.

The School's potential is found in its strong team of faculty and support staff, Alvin said, and he looks forward to the opportunity to help support and enhance the School's research and teaching achievements.

The Evolution of a Visual Identity for SLIS

It is my pleasure this morning, as part of the opening ceremonies for the 1997 Professional Development Day, to officially unveil our new logo and poster, and to introduce the designer, Ana Isabel Herrera. We first identified the need for a logo as we put together a new recruitment plan for the MLIS program, to ensure that we continue to attract the best applicants from a wide range of backgrounds. And because we value professional education, it was natural for us to approach other aspiring professionals. Dr. Hope Olson contacted the Department of Art and Design and had the privilege of working with Professor Jorge Frascara and three graduate students on a logo design.

To provide a context within which to work, Hope took the students a variety of background information about the School and the MLIS program: our vision as captured in the newly-adopted School motto (Understanding information: exploring issues, creating access, pursuing equity), information about our students and graduates, and information about our recruitment plans.

Hope endeavoured to think in creative ways to explain what we represent and how we would like to be seen. As their work progressed, Hope even took a survey of what colours best expressed library and information studies (and of course there were lots of voices heard about that!).

Of 3 proposed designs, the approach by Ana Herrera was chosen to represent the School. Her logo illustrates the connections between librarians and other information professionals, and those who seek and use information.

The integrated design was also perceived by various students and faculty as being like a sun, a snowflake, a network or web, a medicine wheel or sacred hoop, an atom, or an X-ray diffraction pattern. And because diversity is one of the characteristics we value, these varied interpretations confirmed our choice of Ana's logo!

We have already begun using it in public presentations and brochures. The first official use of the logo was by Dr. Altmann, who used it as part of her title page in her research presentation at ALISE, the Association for Library and Information Science Education. We have also used it on brochures for an aboriginal students' career fair and for University Preview Days in February 1997.

Ana Herrera went on to design a poster specifically for our recruitment campaign, using the number one colour choice - blue - and adding red for contrast. Economizing for us by using only two colours, she nonetheless gave the poster both depth and excitement.

We have been fortunate to have Ana's talents at work for us. Ana is originally from Mexico where she did her undergraduate study. She has experience working in animation projects and publishing design, as well as teaching in a university in Mexico. As a student at the University of Alberta, she holds the prestigious Walter H. Johns Graduate Fellowship and the University of Alberta Master of Design Scholarship, which is the major scholarship in the Department of Art and Design.

We wish to thank Ana for her sensitivity to our needs, and for her creativity in expressing them. In recognition of the efforts of all three students and Professor Frascara, the School has made a donation to the Department of Art and Design, for the purchase of art materials to support their graduate students' work.

We are also grateful for the financial support of the Alumni Association, in the design and production of the logo and of our new promotional materials. We are particularly indebted to the current LISAA president, **Della Jacobson**, for her leadership, and to all members of the Association, for their continuing moral and financial support.

Last but not least, I want to thank Dr. Olson for her initiative, efforts, and time, in working with the students in Art and Design, to bring about this successful result to what seemed like a "pie in the sky" only a few months back - thank you Hope.



Faculty of Education Graduate Student Research Expo

On February 28, 1997, the Faculty of Education held a Graduate Student Research Expo in which current research projects of graduate and post doctoral students were exhibited. The Research Expo was attended by students and professors, as well as a Visiting Committee comprised of distinguished members of the Edmonton business and arts communities who were interested in learning more about the Faculty of Education and the current research that is being done at the University of Alberta. There were a total of 27 participants who all displayed their research in poster format.

Two second year students from the School of Library and Information Studies participated in this event: Brenda Philip and Denise Koufogiannakis. Brenda's project was entitled: "English Literature Doctoral Students'Information Needs Study" and



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Denise's project was on "Public Library and Information Needs of People Who are Blind or Visually Impaired". Both projects arose out of the LIS 597 class, Advanced Research Methods, taught by Dr. Alvin Schrader. The projects were very well received and generated much interest. Brenda and Denise will both be convocating with a MLIS this June.

Recent Events and Seminars

The Accessible Canadian Library

On March 26th, 1997, a workshop called: "The Accessible Canadian Library" was presented by **Katherine**Miller, the Library Development Officer at the National Library of Canada. She gave two presentations, one in the morning at the Stanley Milner branch of the Edmonton Public Library, and one in the afternoon at the School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alberta. This seminar was sponsored by LISAA, SLIS, GELA, the Edmonton Public Library, and the University of Alberta Library system.

Both sessions were well attended by librarians and SLIS students who were eager to find out how to make library environments more accessible to clients with disabilities. Through a combination exercises. lectures and group discussions. Ms. Miller enabled participants to experience first-hand the effect of reading and writing disorders. Her sensitive approach of "seeing the person first, and then the disability"

provided the attendees with a new insight into the nature of various disabilities.

strategy known A.D.A.P.T.A.B.L.E., Katherine Miller provided numerous tips and guidelines for altering existing library facilities as well as advice on how to plan new buildings and services with the needs of the disabled in mind. All participants received a copy of the guide: The Accessible Canadian Library II: A Resource Tool for Libraries Serving Persons with Disabilities. This guide is an invaluable resource which comprises exceptional lists of print and electronic sources and specifications for a barrier free library.

"What are We Worth?" Seminar

Maggie Weaver, (Intellisearch, Metro Toronto Reference Library) was in Alberta in late January; her mission was to give a workshop entitled "What are We Worth? Establishing Charge-back or User Fees", for AALT and CASLIS (Edmonton Chapter). On January 31st, Maggie was generous enough to give a free workshop to the School of Library Studies. Well, as you all probably know, the words: "students" and "free" are

usually synonymous, and Maggie was able to give a highly informative and eyeopening workshop!

Copyright Seminar

In February, Karen Adams, CLA's Executive Director, spoke to MLIS students about the issues concerning copyright. She outlined CLA's values of literacy, access, intellectual freedom and privacy. She spoke about technology, telecommunications, and public policy and how these things may affect libraries and their values. The discussion of technology lead to a major concern of CLA present: convergence. Convergence is the catch all term that encompasses the sending and receiving digital information (Internet, televisions, telephone, radio, etc.) by the same cable routes. This concept raises issues that would render the values of libraries even more difficult to adhere to. and suggests that this could lead to a monopoly in the industry. Ms. Adams was adamant when she said that: "librarians need to be aware of telecommunications policy as we are stakeholders in the information industry", and suggested that convergence could lead to libraries abandoning access equity as a value -- not because we don't believe in it, but because we wouldn't be able to provide it. In order to stay aware and fight the issue, Ms. Adams suggested that "students and practitioners become informed" through research, and practice advocacy in and outside of the library and information community.

1996 Professional Development Day Highlights:

Besides guest seminars, workshops and coursework, students also participated in Professional Development Day, a mini conference held on March 7th here at the U of A. This year, Professional Development Day was organized by second year students, Brenda Philip and Michael Sambir with the theme: Approaching 2000". "Librarians Speakers for Professional Development Day have traditionally been combination of students presenting their research and guest speakers from Edmonton's library community.

This year, guest speakers included: James Campbell, Chair of the Public Edmonton Library Board: Jacqueline Dumas, the owner Orlando Books; and Susie Levesque, a U of A MLIS graduate, now working with O'Callaghan Honey. Respectively, the topics of their talks were: "Building the Alberta Library', "Censorship and Pornography: Independent An Bookstore's Perspective", and "Using Your Information Skills Outside the Traditional Library Setting".

The student research covered a broad spectrum of topics from Kim Clarke's Comparison of 2 Legal Databases to Denise Koufogiannakis's research about Public Libraries and Information Needs of People Who are Blind or Visually Impaired. Darlene Holowachuk presented her research regarding the Experience of Immigrant Women with Canadian Public Libraries, and Erja

Research Among Faculty Members of Chemistry at the University of Alberta. Lori van Rooijen spoke about the Service Quality of Interlibrary Loan Service in Academic Libraries at the Unviersity of Alberta, researched through unobtrusive studies. Professional Development Day coordinator, Brenda Philip presented her research about English Literature Doctoral Students and Their Information Needs Study.

It was a highly informative day which provided students with an opportunity to participate in a forum of research and discussion. After a day of presentations and guest speakers, the students were treated to a "Welcome to the Profession" reception sponsored by the Library and Information Studies Alumni Association (thank you all, very much!). Students and guests mingled over delicious goodies (and of course, Della's fruit punch was a hit!) while discussing with anticipation, their forthcoming profession.

1995 SLIS Graduate Placement and Salary Survey Results

The 1995 Survey results indicate that the rate of placement of MLIS graduates

from the U of A has remained relatively stable over the past three years, with approximately 8 out of 10 finding positions in library and information services within 6 months of graduation. However, as in earlier years, only half of the 1995 graduates working full time were employed in permanent positions, and even they were likely to have worked in one or more temporary situations at some point since graduation.

The earning power of 1995 graduates is up from the previous year. The average salary for full-time positions was \$32,093 per year, an increase of almost 8% over 1994. for the first time in recent years, female graduates outpaced male graduates in starting salaries, averaging \$2,207 more than their male counterparts.

The most frequent employers of our graduates continue to be public and postsecondary libraries, each accounting for a third of all placements, with government libraries, business libraries, and the information industry together supplying the balance of positions. Forty percent of the graduates were employed in some area of reference service, but many had additional more specific responsibilities as well. The majority of graduates continue to find placements in Alberta, although proportionately fewer than in 1994

The School's job board continues to be the primary resource for our graduates to learn about available positions, with one in three mentioning it, followed by word of mouth, newspaper advertisements, previous employment at the agency, the Edmonton Public Library jobline and bulletin board, and the University of Toronto jobline and internet job site.
