

Strains of Mozart (not Cole Porter) could be heard on November 12, 1987 in the U of A Faculty Club when about 125 alumni, colleagues, friends and relatives gathered to wish John and Shirley Wright a happy retirement.

University of Alberta President Myer Horowitz delivered a gift no one else could assurance that the Faculty would remain intact. The announcement had been made earlier in the week to faculty members, but was welcome news to the alumni assembled in the audience. The President's remarks were met with applause and cheers. John and Shirley were visibly delighted with the decision.

Presented to the retiring couple was a book of memories which contained letters, photographs, poems, telegrams and an assortment of momentos packaged by Marion Saffran from the many submissions received from alumni across the country. If you were unable to attend the soiree, take comfort in the knowledge that you helped to create a splendid evening complete with a souvenir representative of years of service, dedication, hard work and fun.

Presented to John and Shirley Wright was a contribution to the University of Alberta Library Science Alumni Association Scholarship Fund. Although donations at the time totalled about \$1,000, contributions continued to pour in during the following weeks. To date \$1,810.00 has been donated in John and Shirley's name to the fund. The contributions are

eligible for matching by the province on a 2 to 1 scale.

John and Shirley Wright were strong advocates of the establishment of a scholarship since the formation of the alumni association.

John and Shirley took the opportunity to share some of their favorite memories of library school. Recapping the highlights of two educators in a short stint at the podium was a difficult task, but each vignette was a tribute to their distinguished careers.

The live music may have jazzed up the festivities, but there was no shortage of cause for celebration. Generous helpings of smiles, good food and good wishes were served to everyone, friends, colleagues and, of course, the guests of honor - John and Shirley Wright.

Editorial: Shelf defenses

Your collection, your bookcase, your titles speak volumes about you.

What if the colleague couldn't discern my literature from his? Who would guess I owned the Darwin and the scientist bought the Dylan Thomas? With the two tastes jammed together on one shelf wouldn't it be logical to conclude that the mind who had consumed this literature was a mess? None of it fit together. And how could it? The marriage didn't work either!

If a woman is what she reads, then her bookcase should reflect her character. Each year as she develops, her bookcase grows. This is evolution. The act of reading is still a linear, solitary pursuit no matter how much you consider yourself a multi-tracker. One word follows another. The pages are numbered consecutively for a reason!



A collective sigh of relief echoed throughout Rutherford South in early November when the University announced there would be no change in the administrative status of the Faculty of Library Science. You will recall from the March '87 issue of News that an ad hoc committee had been established to review alternative proposals. After much research, lobbying and support from the professional community, it was decided by the administration to leave the existing structure intact.

Many thanks to all those who put their support in writing. Your letters really did raise professional consciousness.

The Faculty Council has recently approved and forwarded to the Vice-President Academic's Office a proposal to change the name of the Faculty and the degree offered.

If the proposal is successful, the Faculty will be known as the Faculty of Library and Information Studies, while the degree will be Master of Library and Information Studies (M.L.I.S.) ... away with Multiple Listing Service confusion! The changes reflect extensive alterations in the curriculum over the last few years as well as the changed scope of the program and the profession at large.

The change does not imply that traditional library interests and values have been abandoned. Rather, that the interests and focus of the faculty have been broadened.

Scholarship fund grows

Since the LSAA was founded, the Executive has exhibited a strong commitment toward offering financial support to students enrolled in U of A's MLS program, future alumni.

Last year the Executive deposited \$500 in a newly established scholarship fund. The graduating class of '87 added \$350 to bring the total to \$850. And when John and Shirley Wright retired, \$1810 was donated to the fund in their name in lieu of gifts. Miscellaneous contributions received through the membership drive totalled \$255. Funds raised from alumni to date amount to \$2915.

This sum is eligible for a 2 to 1 matching grant from the provincial government. After the grant is received, the potential capital available amounts to \$8745.

An additional \$5,000 was given to the LSAA fund by the University of Alberta Alumni Association (the big one of which we are one constituent) to help establish the scholarship. The university has recognized that the Faculty of Library Science was underfunded and lacking scholarship monies.

The Awards Office at U of A administers the funds and advises that 10% be awarded annually to the scholarship recipient. This means that as early as the Fall of '88, a cheque in excess of \$1,200 could be awarded to a student entering his or her first year of library science.

Criteria for the selection of the successful candidate have been ratified by the LSAA Executive and forwarded for approval by the Awards Office that coordinates for the university as a whole.

The scholarship will be awarded annually to a first year student who best exhibits academic and professional promise.

As the fund grows, look for further accounting in News. The latest information regarding the scholarship will be available at the AGM in Jasper on April 29, 1988, 4 pm.

Faculty Notes

Computing facility uncorked

On January 27, FLS invited students, staff and alumni to celebrate the Grand Opening of the newly renovated Library/Laboratory.

Formal presentation of the Alexander Consulting Group endowment was made as officials from University Hall were on hand to receive the gift presented by corporate executives Brian Kennedy and Perry Dorgan. The endowment, after matching, is valued at \$60,000 and is earmarked for technological support for the laboratory.

The facelift, completed in two stages over the past two years, cost in excess of \$110,000 including the installation of computer lines for several of the 14 terminals housed in the lab section.

Champagne and food flowed for the more than 75 well wishers attending the celebration.

Say hello to MOLLI

No she isn't a new student, but MOLLI is putting a new face on the faculty's laboratory.

MOLLI is a state-of-the-art, totally integrated online catalogue and circulation system designed for IBM and compatible computers.

MOLLI is easy to use, implements clear and concise menus and has adopted a "fill in the blanks" approach to searching.

To date about 200 picture books and juvenile fiction books have been entered into the system.

The system has proved mutually beneficially to staff and students. **Professor Andre**

Nitecki secured a Small Faculties Research Grant for a collection analysis of the historical children's collection housed in the closed stacks on the main floor of Rutherford South. He will be utilizing the system during the course of his investigation.

Donna MacKintosh, a PEP student, has been assigned to the project and is responsible for coding and data input.

Support for the effort was also secured from Nichols Advanced Technologies Inc., Edmonton.

Wilsonstation working hard

Since its arrival in FLS, the Wilsonline workstation has enjoyed several enhancements.

FLS acquired a subscription to Wilson's Library Literature database which currently indexes about 200 North American and international library periodicals and selected monographs, conference proceedings and audio-visual materials.

The Library Literature database available on CD-ROM is updated and cumulated quarterly. Current coverage is retrospective to December, 1984.

Other CD-ROM databases available at the faculty include a Wilson demonstration disc of 16 Wislon databases, Grolier's Electronic Encyclopedia (a 20 volume. 9 million encyclopedia on a single compact disc which is full-text searchable) and a BIBLIOFILE demo disc. The University of Guelph Library catalogue is also coming to the workstation. The CD-ROM catalogue was a gift to all Canadian library schools.

Demonstrations of the Wilson workstation are available in Room 1-15.
