Kevin McMillan has become one of the most respected lyric baritones of his generation. Critics continue to praise his "elegant voice" and "singularly remarkable interpretive skills" in appearances with virtually every major North American orchestra. In the past ten years, Mr McMillan has performed with conductors such as Kurt Masur, Roger Norrington, Herbert Blomstedt, Sergiu Commissiona, Raphael Frühbeck de Burgos, Jesus Lopes-Cobos, Andrew Davis, Neeme Järvi, Robert Shaw, Pierre Boulez and Charles Dutoit. His stature in Europe continues to grow, with recent appearances in the major concert halls of Berlin, Paris, Hamburg, Bamberg and Prague.

After preliminary schooling at the Universities of Guelph and Western Ontario, he studied at the Britten-Pears School in England, and attained a Master's degree at the Juilliard School in New York. His primary focus has always been the oratorio and orchestral repertoire, and his vocal flexibility and scholarly musicianship afford him a broad range of styles and periods, from the title role in Monteverdi's *Orfeo* to Mahler's *Das Lied von der Erde*. He has also been an active part of the creative process, with more and more modern works being written expressly for him, including the title role in Peter Maxwell Davies' new oratorio, *Job*. Despite partial paraplegia as a result of injuries sustained in an accident years ago, he also enjoys forays into the operatic repertoire. In semi-staged presentations, he has played the roles of 'Schaunard' in *La Boheme*, 'Papageno' in *Die Zauberflöte*, 'Dr Falke' in *Die Fledermaus*, and 'Masetto' in *Don Giovanni*.

Mr McMillan's first love has always been the solo recital. He has been described as an "outstanding Schubertian" whose "young voice of glowing freshness and beauty is at the service of an intelligent, lively and distinctive personality." He is one of the busiest recital singers in Canada, heard regularly on CBC/SRC broadcasts, and he is a regular guest at summer festivals such as the Minnesota Orchestra's Viennese Sommerfest, Ravinia, and Tanglewood.

He has recorded for London/Decca, Chandos, Deutsche Harmonia Mundi and Pro Arte. His Canadian releases for Marquis, Dorian and CBC Records have been nominated for four JUNO awards. His London/Decca recording of Nielsen's Symphony #3 with Herbert Blomstedt and the San Francisco Symphony was named Best Symphonic Recording of the Year by Gramophone Magazine, and his *Carmina burana* with the same forces was awarded a GRAMMY.
