# **RESPONSES TO THE COMMEMORATIVE ISSUE**

# RALPH NWAMEFOR. NIGERIA

I read Dr Bertram's 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary speech chronicling the history of the School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, which appeared in the Winter 2008 Newsletter (LISAA) issue with a lot of interest. But I must state that I was disappointed... I strongly believe that one cannot write a balanced history or account about the School if one ignores the Betty Henderson years or the Betty Henderson contributions.

I must admit that I did not meet Sarah Rebecca Reed, the founder and first Director of the School for whom Dr. Bertram exhibited such an overwhelming admiration resulting from her image which was cast over the speech. I, however, felt her echo when I arrived at the School by September 1972 to begin my program after surviving a bout of malaria which forced me into the University of Alberta Teaching Hospital and nearly resulted in missing my first exam. If Miss Reed was as formidable as Dr. Bertram would make us believe, it means that the University of Alberta administration has a peculiar knack for fielding formidable ladies as directors of that School because Betty Henderson can hardly be said to be less formidable, though very amiable. What was more, she was a workaholic with such an even temper that would manifest no expression at all over, for instance, Dr Bertram's fad of wearing pant suits to work.

Betty Henderson so well stabilized the two programs I met in the School-The BLS and the MLSthat when she left the School on retirement, the University, in appreciation of her exemplary role in library education, named an important hall in the School after her. ... A well known University in Eastern Canada also awarded Henderson a professorship based on her exploits at the University of Alberta. And she was able to compete for and become the President of the Canadian Library Association (which ARE THERE OTHER RESPONSES? the excellent work she did at Edmonton gualified her for) before she retired from public service.... Before she died she instituted the M.E.P Henderson Scholarship in Library and Information Studies each year which recognizes academic performance and professional promise of two entering or continuing MLIS students in the School.

As a graduate of the "Class of 4", I was interested to read the reminiscences of some of the members of the early classes at the newly-minted library school in Edmonton.

I was disappointed that there was no mention in the newsletter of one of my mentors, the late great Harry Newsom, who joined the school at the same time I was there from the Saskatchewan Provincial Library. Who could take one of Harry's classes and not remember "Books, buildings and bodies" and "Do you see what I'm saying?" and the fact that he made a student cry by suggesting that libraries could lend books from bars and churches (yes, both!)?

I remember Kurt Jensen and Basil Pogue - but I can't recall Dracula showing up for class in the winter of 1972.

Speaking of professional promise, as Sheila Bertram did in her address, two early graduates of SLIS not mentioned, both from my class, were Phyllis Yaffe, who went from the Winnipeg Public Library to Algonquin College to the Canadian Children's Book Centre and is now CEO of Alliance Atlantis; and your own director, Ann Curry.

I personally have held Shirley (Ellison) Wright's old job as Head of Children's Services at the New Westminster Public Library in New Westminster, BC for the past 35 years, which has been professional reward enough. And you can tell Kurt that I do have a copy of the Frog'n'All if he is still looking.

# **NEWS FROM SLIS**

SCHOOL OF LIBRARY AND INFORMATION STUDIES

We at SLIS have always emphasized excellent teaching, and this focus was celebrated with the Faculty of Education Graduate Teaching Award that Professor Toni Samek received on April 8, 2009 at the Awards Gala: A Celebration of Research and Teaching Excellence. Dr. Kent Den Hayer, who presented the award to Toni, said that he "had come to know Toni as a passionate advocate for scholarly engagement with the pressing issues of our time. In her teaching dossier, students write of the passion as igniting their interest to pursue further study and advocacy. I think that there is a strong link between a commitment to human betterment and Toni's teaching excellence." Congratulations, Toni.

Another recent SLIS award winner is Dr. Margaret Mackey, who was awarded a Killam Professorship in early May, one of only six such awards given each year at the University of Alberta for "outstanding contributions to scholarship and to the University community." Margaret's research and teaching concentrate on contemporary patterns of literacy, and her courses on Contemporary Theories and Practices of Reading and on Multimedia Literacies remain two of the most popular and highly-praised of all SLIS courses. Congratulations, Margaret.

SLIS is pleased to offer again the Archives course after a short hiatus and to offer some new courses this spring/summer. The provincial archivist Leslie Latta-Guthrie and her team of archivists are teaching the Archives management course in May/June, and Leslie has included tours of four Edmonton archives and several hands on preservation exercises in the course. The spring brings the first offerings of our new one-credit weekend courses, designed to bring more curriculum options to SLIS students and to provide professional development opportunities for practicing librarians. The 1-credit Legal Resources and Services course offered May 8-10 had an enrolment of 20 SLIS students and librarians seeking to increase their knowledge of libraries and the law. People commented that they really appreciated being able to take a course that fit so well around their home, work, and other course commitments. Other 1-credit weekend courses to be offered in spring/summer include Aboriginal Resources/Services, Emergent Literacy, and XML Programming.

As a joint venture, LISAA and the School hosted a 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary reception on April 30<sup>th</sup> at the Saskatchewan Library Association Conference in Saskatoon. A personal mailed invitation was extended to our 104 SLIS alumni now residing in Saskatchewan, and we were very pleased that 30 alumni were able to join us to celebrate the School's anniversary. Director Dr. Ann Curry and faculty member Dr. Lisa Given (a speaker at the conference) welcomed the alumni members at the reception.

# LISAA'S GIFT TO SLIS STUDENTS

Each year, the LISAA Executive chooses a special project for either the Library School, or the Library School students. You can designate funds for these special projects on your membership form, or you can donate to the Special Project fund at any time of the year!

Two complementary works by local artist Loren Chabot were purchased with the 2008 alumni funds, both of which are to be hung in the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor reception area just as one enters the School from the elevator foyer. One painting shows a daytime summer view of the downtown city skyline with the North Saskatchewan River and the Riverboat Queen in the foreground. The second painting is a nighttime winter view of the same skyline, with the lights of the Macdonald Hotel and various office buildings reflected in the snow of the frozen River. Chabot is a U of A graduate, and exhibits his work every Saturday at the Old Strathcona Farmers' Market.

This year, upon request by the Library and Information Studies Students' Association, the funds were used to purchase two Olympus DS-40 digital voice recorders. The recorders will be readily available for students, who will be able to use them to record interviews for various classes or lectures given by guest speakers.
