

#### **Facts**

- 5.5 million km²
- 6,600km long
- 30 million people
- 350 ethnic groups
- (60 isolated)
- 10% of worlds known biodiversity
- 17% landcover lost in past 50 years
- 0.5 billion metric tons of carbon released each year (not including fires)



### Fishers Workshop

- Resource Managers, Community Leaders & Academics
- Concerns:
  - Impact of installation of a harbor in Santarem to be used for the transport of soya beans
  - Impact on turtle populations, fish larvae, community health
  - Turtles traditional food. Community currently monitoring. Populations of fish and turtles declining.
  - Mercury in fish a concern. Naturally high in Amazon. Chronic exposure a problem in the region (gold mines, agricultural runoff)
  - Fish health/population research behavior, consumption
- "When you take to eat, eventually your belly will get full."
  When you take to sell, your wallet will never get full."





#### Field Work

- Tapajos Community Visits
  - Sharing results of previous interviews/field work (poster sharing)
  - Interviewing Fishers using identification photos (150+)
  - Bringing news to isolated communities
- Trombetas Fish Collection
  - Visit community leader, ask to identify a fisher
  - Fisher accompanies team to set nets, and collect
  - Fishers are interviewed
  - Fish are measured, photographed and stored for lab analysis

- Continued for 2 addition weeks
- Lived in community with student/translator
- Continued conducting interviews





#### Lessons Learned

- Global news coverage doesn't always reflect local, on the ground reality

- Indigenous peoples face similar issues globally:
  - Destruction of nature
  - Water pollution
  - Worried about develop
  - Suggest a more balanced life
