Melco'm Forsyth, Ronald Morrill John Thompson, Christopher Taylor Duets for Young 'Collists was written for the amusement of my daughter, seven years old at the time and playing mostly in first position. It was time to introduce her to more difficult rhythmic patterns, such as five-eight, seven-eight, five-four, and rapidly changing meters. Amanda provided the individual titles and, in the case of number five, the thematic material as well.

Mirrors was inspired by the choreography of Mauryne Allan, with whom I collaborated during 1978 in Toronto. The work will be premiered in dance form by the Mountain Dance Theatre in Vancouver later this month, under the title,

Mirrors - Shadows, with the choreography of Mauryne Allan.

Aphorisms for Brass came into existence as a set of brief demonstration pieces for brass instruments during the schools' performances of the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra. They have since been performed by many brass quintets in many countries.

Steps is my first work for a solo string instrument, having been written for Donald McInnes and Isobel Moore, who performed i: at the Banff Festival in August, 1978.

Dark introduces dancer-choreographer Mauryne Allan to Edmonton audiences. Ms. Allan is director of the Mountain Dance Theatre in Vancouver, and was the recipient of the Clifford E. Lee Award for Choreography in 1978. This work is entirely abstract and, while also introducing the composer as recorder player, affords the opportunity for unlimited interpretation on the part of the audience, with a suggestive use of space and sound.

The Melancholy Clown is a student work which has had countless performances around the world since it was written seventeen years ago. Stravinsky's Petrushka, Picasso's clown, and Marcel Marçeau's character, "Bip", all come to mind in this charade of bitter-sweet tomfoolery.

Quartet '74 expresses my faith in the trombone ensemble as a medium for more than idle musical pleasantries, though the finale hardly "serious". Eleven-eight meter is almost omnipresent: in a quite predictable and repetetive subdivision in the second movement, and a totally unpredictable and erratic form in the finale.
