I have a BA (Honors) in Anthropology, research lithics and how imagery is used in archaeology. I love knitting and spin my own wool.




### Tristan Mula, MA student

### Ride, Ride, Let It Ride: Pathological Lesions in Horse **Skeletons Related to Riding.**

Over 30 years, researchers have studied horse domestication by examining skeletal changes linked to riding. This study tested methods on 12 horses from Alberta, finding three with riding evidence, three inconclusive, and six without. It also discusses limitations in methods, collections, and researcher interpretation.
