Pianist Francine Kay has performed to public and critical acclaim throughout Canada, the United States and Europe. In Canada, she has appeared as soloist with orchestras across the country including the Toronto Symphony, Symphony Nova Scotia, the Calgary Philharmonic, the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, Orchestra London and the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony.

When she made her recital debut at Toronto's St. Lawrence Centre in 1987, the headline of the Star review exclaimed that "Francine Kay played with poetic brilliance". Performances that year also included her debut recital at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa where her "commanding performance" and "magnetic presence" drew the Ottawa Citizen headline "Pianist shines in debut". Since that time, Ms Kay has toured from coast to coast and has gained recognition as one of Canada's finest pianists. Recent concert engagements have also included the Women's Musical Club of Toronto, and a twelve concert tour of the Atlantic provinces under the auspices of Debut Atlantic, as well as a highly successful debut in London, England. Her concerts are frequently broadcast on radio and television and she has been a regular guest on CBC Radio's *Arts National* and *Mostly Music* programs.

Francine Kay received her early musical training at L'Ecole de Musique Vincent D'Indy in Montréal where she studied with Yvonne Hubert. A scholarship from the government of France took her to Paris to study with Yvonne Lefébure as part of the "Juillet Musicale". She then went on to obtain her Master of Music Degree at the Juilliard School in New York as a scholarship student of Adele Marcus. Ms Kay was awarded scholarships from the Banff Centre for six consecutive years. While at Banff, she participated in the Advanced Music Studies program and was regularly featured as soloist on all of their concert series. She pursued her postgraduate studies with Marek Jablonski and Leon Fleisher. Honoured with numerous awards, Francine Kay was the first recipient of the Women's Musical Club of Toronto Career Development Award in 1989. That same year she gave the world premiere of distinguished Canadian composer Oskar Morawetz's "Four Contrasting Moods". Francine Kay has also received the Chalmers Award, the St. Lawrence Award, a Canada Council Career Development Grant, and a full fellowship from the Tanglewood Music Centre.
