
A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE RCA BAND

The band of the Royal Canadian Artillery traces its roots to Quebec City. In 1879, the "B" Battery band of the Royal Canadian Artillery (a permanent force unit) became the first permanent military band based in Canada. The band was comprised of professionally trained musicians from England and France, and was a concert favourite of Quebecers. In 1899 this band became The Royal Canadian Artillery Band.

The band has been stationed in several cities in the last century, including Quebec, Montreal, Halifax, and Edmonton. Active in both World Wars and the Korean conflict, the band has seen service in many parts of the world as well as throughout Canada. The band has been re-formed three times – 1947,1968, and 1994 in keeping with rationalizations of the Canadian Forces. In the last seven years, the band has participated in the "Canada Remembers" program (1994-95) which commemorated Canada's contribution to the Second World War. This took the band to Asia, England, Holland and Belgium. The band moved briefly from Montreal to Valcartier in 1996, and in December 1997, was officially welcomed to Edmonton by the former Garrison Commander Col JJ Selbie.

Since arriving in Edmonton, The RCA Band has performed extensively in the local area. In addition to normal military duties, the band performs at schools and concert halls in the city and thoughout the province. As well, it particiaptes in street parades such as Klondike Days. The band has already made two local television appearances, and taken a musical role in many high-profile ceremonies in the city. In the past two years, The RCA Band has represented Land Forces Western Area in California, Colorado, Quebec, Ottawa, and South Korea. The band takes pride in supporting the major units of LFWA at bases across western Canada.

This 35 piece brass and reed ensemble is one of six professional bands in Canada, and is commanded by Captain Heather C. Davis, CD.



Captain H.C. Davis, CD

Captain Heather Davis, The Commanding Officer and Director of Music of the Royal Canadian Artillery Band, was born in Ottawa, Ontario into and Airforce family. She spent her school years in various locations including Edmonton and Calgary, AB, Trenton, Ontario and Bracknell, UK. She studied various musical instruments while attending high school and upon completion of Grade 13, auditioned on trombone with the Air Transport Command Band. She was accepted into The Canadian Forces School of Music in 1976.

Captain Davis spent two years at The Canadian Forces School of Music in Victoria, BC studying oboe before being posted to the Central Band, Ottawa in 1978. She spent six years with this musical organization, playing piano with the "Serenade of Strings", singing in various vocal ensembles, playing trombone in the parade band, oboe in the concert band and writing numerous musical arrangements.

In 1984, then Sergeant Davis was promoted to Warrant Officer. She returned to The Canadian Forces School of Music to serve in the staff position of Oboe Instructor for one year before being posted to The Naden Band of Maritime Forces Pacific, in Victoria.

In 1987 Warrant Officer Davis wsa transferred to a staff position at CFSMUS/CFB Borden, ON. She was posted to The Stadacona Band of Maritime Forces Atlantic in 1989 and in 1991 back to CFSMUS as a student on the Assistant Director of Music Course. Upon successful completion of the course, she was posted back to Halifax and was promoted to Chief Petty Officer Second - Class. She accepted a commission from the ranks in July 1995.

Career highlights have included musical arrangements for Maureen Forrester (1981), Nova Scotia International Tattoo (1993), First International China Band Festival (1995) and Breda Holland Tattoo (1995). She was the prize winning composer of Canada's centennial march (1994) and has sung the national anthem during a Toronto Blue Jays game at Skydome (1993), a Toronto Argonaut football game (1993) and the Labatt Brier Curling championship game (1995).

Captain Davis is the first and only woman to be commissioned in the Regular Force of the Canadian Forces Band Branch.



Chief Warrant Officer L.G. Smith, CD 1

Chief Warrant Officer Verne Smith was born in Goose Bay, Labrador. Raised in a Military family, he spent his youth in a variety of locations however, he now considers Edmonton, Alberta his hometown. CWO Smith studied percussion, trombone, and euphonium throughout Junior High and Secondary School. He was actively involved in the Navy League and Sea Cadet Band movement which helped prepare him for a career as a professional musician in the military.

Due to his keen interest in music, CWO Smith joined the Canadian Forces in 1971 and was posted to the Canadian Forces School of Music in Esquimalt, British Columbia. He studied Euphonium for 18 months and was posted to the PPCLI Band where he served for fifteen years as a vocalist, euphonium instrumentalist, trombonist and percussionist.

In 1988, he was posted to the CF School of Music at Canadian Forces Base Borden as the trombone and euphonium instructor. In 1993 CWO Smith attended the year-long Assistant Director of Music course at Canadian Forces Base Borden and was subsequently posted to the Stadacona Band in Halifax, Nova Scotia. He was promoted to CPO2 in 1998 and enjoyed serving in the East Coast Navy for another two years.

CWO Smith received his promotion to the Chief Warrant Officer and assumed the position of Band Sergeant-Major/Assistant Director of Music of the Royal Canadian Artillery Band in August of 2000.

Sergeant Matthew Clark

Sergeant Matthew Clark joined the Canadian Forces in 1994 where he played with the Band of the Ceremonial Guard in Ottawa for four summers. In 1997 he won the audition for the Regular Force, made the move to Edmonton and took up his position as a member of The Royal Canadian Artillery Band.

Matthew was born in Southport England and immigrated with his family to Canada in 1977. He started playing music at an early age under the tutelage of his father, who is an accomplished musician, teacher and euphonium soloist. Sgt Clark has performed with many ensembles throughout his playing career, most notably the Toronto Wind Orchestra, The Toronto Youth Wind Orchestra, Intrada Brass and London Citadel Band of the Salvation Army. Sgt Clark studied the euphonium with Frank Harmantas at the University of Toronto, majoring in Music Education. He has been recorded as a soloist and has soloed throughout Canada, the United States, England, Holland and Korea.

Along with his playing duties, Matthew is also the Assistant Drum Major of the Band.



Sergeant Marc Beaudin

Born in Sept-Iles Québec, Marc started music playing drums when he was a child. Later on, he got interested in playing guitar and when to CEGEP de Trois-Rivières where he studied with Alain Hénault for three years. Subsequently, Marc took on electric bass and played professionally with a various cover band for a few years. In 1988, he decided to join full-time, the Canadian Forces. In order to further his musicianship, Marc started studying with Mr. Charlie Banacos from Boston (Mike Stern's teacher), Dr. Jay Bregman from the University of Maine and Lorne Lofsky in Toronto. In October 98, he joined the RCA band as an electric bass player. Somehow, Marc turned out to be a *musical chameleon* for the band doubling on tuba, banjo, percussions, string bass, vocal and guitar.

In June 2000, with the support of CBC radio and a grant from the Arts Council, Marc released his first CD entitled *Innuenda*.
