Judith Richardson completed her BMus in voice in 1978 and started her professional career in Pretoria, South Africa where she performed opera and oratorio with chamber orchestras. She also sang in many festivals and traveled to England to give concerts and masterclasses in such venues as St. Martin in the Fields, St. Catherines College, Cambridge, St Margarets, Westminster Abbey and The Dartington Festival. Since her return to Edmonton, she has performed with the Alberta Baroque Ensemble and the Red Deer and Lethbridge Symphonies and in the Music at Convocation Hall series. She is a voice teacher and continues to give an Art Song course at King's University College in July.

Michelle Wylie studied music in the Honours program at the University of Alberta graduating with first class honours in 1995. She received numerous academic and musical awards including the Edmonton Opera Guild Award, Eva Shaw Memorial Prize and Universiade '83 Scholarship. While at the University she studied under the direction of Harold Weins and since graduation has continued her studies with Diane Nelson and Alexandra Munn. She has also participated in the NUOVA Summer Intensive program in Edmonton and the ARIA International Summer Academy in London, Ontario. Ms. Wylie has been a member of the Edmonton Opera Chorus since 1995 and most recently performed as the Countess Ceprano in the Edmonton Opera production of *Rigoletto*. In addition to performing, Ms. Wylie is also a vocal instructor in the Sherwood Park area and at Northwest Bible College.

Stephen Williams holds a BMus from the University of Alberta (1996) and is a graduate of the Grant MacEwan College Music Program. A regular performer with the Edmonton Symphony trumpet section, he has also performed with Edmonton Opera, Alberta Ballet, and the Alberta Philharmonic as well as numerous solo and guest artist performances in the Edmonton region. As a teacher, Stephen was on faculty at The Alberta College Conservatory of Music for five years, as well as working at Augustana, Lakeland, Keyano and Red Deer Colleges. Stephen has been the stage manger for the Alberta Baroque Ensemble since 1997, and co-ordinates the Edmonton Student Trumpet Workshop every summer. Currently Stephen can be found teaching private brass lessons at his home and Augustana University College, conducting with the Festival City Winds community band program, as well as performing regularly. Stephen, his wife Suzanne, and son Simon reside in Edmonton, with the cat, Purr C. Grainger.

Frank Ho was born in Hong Kong and came to Canada at the age of five. He studied at the Alberta College Conservatory of Music under the guidance of Evan Verchomin and James Keene. At 17, he was awarded a scholarship to continue his studies at Yale University, where he worked under the tutelage of Sidney Harth and Erick Friedman. Further studies took him to the Guildhall School of Music in London, England, where his teacher was the late Yfrah Neaman. He came back to Canada in 1991 to pursue studies in Musicology at the University of Alberta. Frank has performed concerts in Canada, the United States, and Europe. He was an instructor at the Alberta College Conservatory of Music from 1991 to 2003, serving as its Head of Strings from 1999 to 2002. In addition to concertizing and teaching, Frank is also an active adjudicator and clinician across western Canada. Currently, he maintains a private studio in Edmonton. Frank holds degrees in both Performance (Master of Music, Yale) and Musicology (B A, MA, University of Alberta).

Elisabeth Scholtz began her musical studies at age 7 with Lillian Stillman. She completed her Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Alberta in 1995 where she received several scholarships for academic and musical achievement. In 1996, she entered the Franz Schubert Konservatorium in Vienna, Austria where, after a year's study, she received a diploma with highest distinction. Her teachers include Helmut Brauss, Marek Jablonski, Michael Badura-Skoda and currently Alexandra Munn of Alberta College. She is active as a freelance musician, piano teacher, and accompanist.

Tammy-Jo Mortensen completed the Master of Music programme (pipe organ performance) at McGill University under the guidance of John Grew and Rejean Poirier in 1997 and she completed a B.Mus. degree under Marnie Giesbrecht at the University of Alberta (1992). She also studied at The King's University College, Edmonton, with Jacobus Kloppers. At present, she teaches privately, is the music director at Robertson-Wesley United Church and manages the "Sundays at 3" Organ Recital Series in Edmonton. She has attracted many children to the organ through her performances of a musical children's story called "Jack and the Beanstalk" (for organ and narrator) composed by Jacobus Kloppers. The next performance of "Jack" will be on the "Saturdays for Kids" series with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra at the Winspear Centre for Music in May 2004.
