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## Welcome Message

The Chair called the meeting to order at 12:30p.m. and welcomed the University Delegates (UDs). A roll call was done, followed by a round table of CIHR staff attending the meeting.

It was announced that Jennifer O'Donoghue, Director, Program Support and Business Transformation, will be replacing Danika Goosney as Chair of the UD network while Danika is on maternity leave.

### 1. Update to the Canada Graduate Scholarships (CGS) Harmonization project

Gordana Krcevinac, Director, Tri-Council Harmonization Project, SSHRC, presented an update on the Canada Graduate Scholarships (CGS) Harmonization project.

The UD's were sent the *Tri-Council Harmonization of the Canada Graduate Scholarships: A Discussion Guide* in advance of the meeting.

A brief introduction of the CGS Harmonization project was provided highlighting the introduction of new elements to the delivery model including:

1. Enhancing co-delivery of the CGS program with Canadian institutions
2. Harmonizing delivery mechanisms, policies, and tools
3. Devolving the CGS Master's program to the institutions
4. Fully harmonizing the CGS Doctoral program

Using the discussion guide as a point of reference the following issues were discussed:

#### Allocation/Distribution of funds

- Questions were raised about the allocation formula for the CGS Master's program and how scholarships would be distributed within the university.
- Concerns were raised about the risk of scholarships being attributed to larger vs. smaller institutions.
- It was explained that the agencies will develop a fair and transparent selection process and will provide guidelines to the universities on the selection process. However, it was noted that the universities will be required to identify their internal priorities and distribute scholarships accordingly.
- The distribution of CGS awards will remain the same (CIHR: 400, NSERC: 800, SSHRC: 1,300 for both Master's and Doctoral awards).
- Different options for the allocation formula are being reviewed, such as the CRC model.

#### Deadlines

- It was mentioned that the lack of deadlines for the Ontario Graduate Scholarship (OGS) program was difficult to manage and caused delays.
- It was recommended that the CGS timelines be in-line with the registration timelines.
- A common national application and national decision deadlines are being considered.

#### Adjudication

- The availability of peer reviewers may be limited at smaller universities due to conflict of interest.
- Finding peer reviewers from specific disciplines may be difficult at smaller institutions.
- Including an additional adjudication process may be problematic.
- It was noted that selection criteria will be the same for all three councils.

#### Other

- It was confirmed that only research-based programs would be eligible and that a common definition for program eligibility is being drafted.
- A question on whether the harmonization team has been or will be looking at data estimating the need for future trainees, was posed. It was explained that these issues are being reviewed as part of the overall training strategy and are not limited to the harmonization of the CGS.
- The importance of maintaining the Research Allowance (\$5K) at the doctoral level was discussed. The UDs were supportive of maintaining the Research Allowance amount.

## **2. CIHR Reforms**

Jane Aubin, CSO/VP, Research and Knowledge Translation, presented an update on CIHR's proposed reforms to the Open Suite of Programs and peer review process.

### CIHR Institution Visits

CIHR is continuing its institution visits across Canada. Dr. Aubin thanked the UDs for their understanding and good wishes with respect to a personal emergency, which necessitated rescheduling four of the institution visits.

The current discussions at the institution visits reflect quite strong support for the program design, and are generally focused around details of the two funding schemes and the eligibility criteria. Some within the research community continue to have concerns regarding the virtual component of peer review, the disappearance of committees, and the composition of the Stage 3 assessment committee. Some concerns continue to be expressed regarding what is meant by the institutional support requirement for the Foundation Scheme, and the proposed changes to the peer review process. Discussions with institution administration representatives have encouraged CIHR to revisit the vision for enhanced support. CIHR is working with institutions to refine the vision, but would like to clarify that institutional support is not focused on dollar amounts. CIHR is planning a discussion in the upcoming months with institutional Vice-Presidents of Research to further discuss the topic of institutional support as well as other key informants to continue with detailed program and peer review design. These topics will be discussed at the UD face-to-face meeting in June.

A question was raised to obtain clarification regarding eligibility and roles for applicants to the Foundation and Project schemes. UDs were referred to the Design Document and were assured that further discussions on eligibility and roles will be discussed at the June face-to-face meeting.

The UDs proposed additional topics for the June face-to-face meeting including:

- Clarifications around how the final assessment committee will evaluate different disciplines of research ("apples vs. oranges").
- Adjudication criteria to be used by the final assessment committees
- Credentials of College of Reviewer members

An updated list of reforms-related Questions and Answers is being developed and will be posted to CIHR's website once available.

## **3. Update on Signature Initiatives**

#### **4. Canadian Association of Postdoctoral Scholars (CAPS) survey**

Danika Goosney, Director, Science, Knowledge Translation and Ethics presented the CAPS survey.

The Canadian Association of Postdoctoral Scholars (CAPS-ACSP), with support from Mitacs, is conducting a national survey of Canadian postdoctoral scholars. This survey is a follow-up to the 2009 survey. The UDs were asked to disseminate the survey to their departments and encourage postdoctoral scholars to complete the survey. The survey requires approximately 20 minutes to complete and will be available until April 29, 2013.

The UDs were sent the link to survey following the teleconference.
