

- Ambulance driver, US Army, 1917-18
- Assistant and translator for the Hoover War Library's collecting of Peace Conference materials, Paris and London, 1919
- Reference Librarian, Hoover War Library, 1923-27
- History professor, NYU / Smith College / Western Reserve University (Cleveland), 1927-40




- Edited 1924-1926; 40 copies printed for the author by Appeal Printing Co. in New York (without copyright notice)
- Distributed to research libraries by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in late 1928/early 1929, to everyone's surprise
- Vol.1 (dated 1924): Miller's own diary
- Vols. 2-20: Documents
- Vol. 21 (dated 1926): Indexes
- Vol. 22: portfolio of folded maps


Parker Thomas Moon (1892-1936)

- Professor of Political Science at Columbia
- Had been in Paris in 1918-19 as a member of the Inquiry and of the American delegation
- Editor of *Political Science Quarterly*; published two articles by Binkley on Peace Conference procedure in 1931

Joint Committee on Materials for Research

- Formed by the Social Science Research Council and the American Council of Learned Societies in 1929
- Binkley became chair in 1932

- Undertook a number of innovative projects, broadly in the field we would call scholarly communications
- Disbanded after Binkley's death in 1940



Frances Binkley (1899-1962)


- One of "The 500" (the capped enrolment of women) at Stanford, graduated 1923
- Developed photographic expertise during microfilm experiments, 1932-33
- Studied portrait photography with Rabinovitch, New York, 1937-38
- Social Science Librarian, University of Colorado at Boulder, 1941-62




Microfilming at Yale, January 1933
