



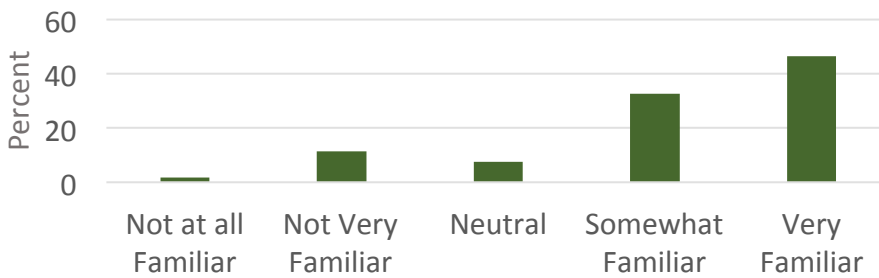
Research Brief: Reporting Child Exposure to Domestic Violence

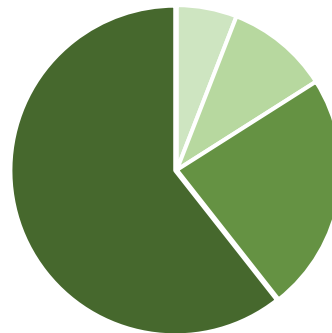
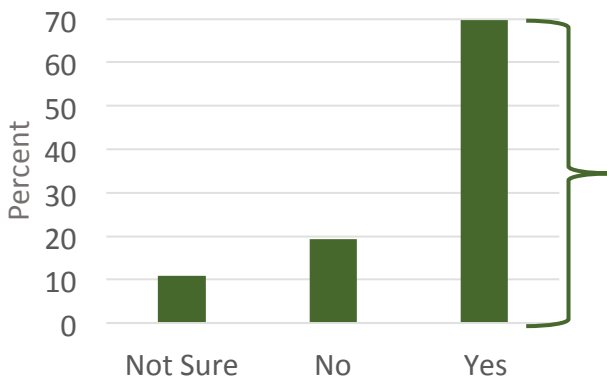

How familiar are teachers with their school's policy on reporting suspected child exposure to domestic violence?



This shows that most teachers are familiar with how to report.

Have teachers ever suspected a child has been exposed to domestic violence?



Did they report their suspicion?

- Never
- Some of the Time
- Most of the Time
- Everytime



Other interesting findings about child exposure to domestic violence:

- Teachers early in their careers are more likely to suspect cases.
- Familiarity with reporting procedures increases with years of experience.
- Feeling supported to report cases also increases with experience.
