How many King Uthals do we have?

If we are collecting the right things, we should anger powerful people.

Our digital preservation commitment is for generations

Regime change is inevitable Physical barriers/borders no longer viable

It's time to talk about extra-territoriality

And perhaps do more than just talk.

Current situation at McMaster

All systems and files resident in library-based data centre. Sole tenant. ~16 TB of unique digital assets (primarily IR and digitized collections) pushed out to Ontario Library Research Cloud (OLRC).

More or less meeting demand of 3-2-1. Moving toward calling it preservation.

A note about OLRC

- Operated entirely within universities.
- 5 distributed nodes.
- Minimum 3 copies.
- No commercial data centres.
- No commercial fibre (VPN on ORION).

4-2-2?

4 copies 2 local, 2 off-site

2 media better: two entities

2 countries? 2+?

Privacy regulations and concerns Currency, language, logistical issues Legal and contractual concerns Trust

Culture

Don't be deterred by red herrings



Get around the barriers

Privacy regulations and concerns Don't include PI or business data Currency, language, logistical issues Eminently solvable Legal and contractual concerns Emphasize partnership; SLA, not contract

Trust *can* be built. Culture *can* change.

What are the components?

Embrace Institution-based storage Research networks Partnerships Agility Avoid "Heavy" collaboration Excessive governance Perfection Just to be perfectly clear:

The first line of defence is still the national solution.

This could be a hedge against "cultural extinction" events
