Observers: Yukon Health and Social Services, Council of Yukon First Nations, Dene Nation, Institute for Circumpolar Health Research

- Building on previous collaboration in 1980s, but with old+new players
- Collected data from Inuit populations in Alaska, Canada and Greenland from 1989-2003
- Agreement of collaboration and data sharing
- Each region provided data to U of Toronto; master tables generated – by year, region, site, age group and sex [Inuit only]
- Preliminary results presented to Inuit Public Health Task Group, Ottawa, April 2008
- Presentation to ArcticNet conference, Quebec, Dec 2008 extensive media coverage
- Published papers in special cancer issue, *International Journal of Circumpolar Health* 2008

Main findings

- Cancer in general increasing among Inuit
- Some "traditional" cancers [nasopharynx, salivary] have not decreased
- "Modern" cancers esp lung now much more – highest in the world; others such as colorectal also catching up, while breast and prostate still low relative to non-Inuit
- Some success story decline in cervical cancer
- Scope for prevention
- Implications for health services

Proposed Next Steps:

- Update data for another 5 years to 2008, thus forming a unique time series of 20 years
- Important to know if cancer trends previously detected have continued or changed
- Circumpolar comparison not just of statistics, but also on cancer care and preventive services
- Data already available technically simple
- Potential Arctic Council project [+ Dene and Sami + Russian indigenous people?]
- Partnership with ITK and ICC
