His research on freshwater aquatic systems is focused in three general areas: 1) understanding the mechanisms relating to species loss, especially in relation to anthropogenic disturbance like land-use change, hydrologic alteration, climate change, invasive species and their impacts to freshwater ecosystems; 2) developing better aquatic assessment methods, including functional diversity, and models on species habitat and connectivity; and, 3) developing methods to improve restoration and reclamation, such as habitat offsets and poaching.
