Andre Nitecki Dies

Former students and friends of Professor Andre Nitecki will be saddened to learn of his death on 1 September 1993 after a series of strokes. Professor Nitecki had retired from the School of Library and Information Studies on 31 December 1992. He was 68 years old.

Born in Poland, Professor Nitecki spent his early years in Europe. A period of internment in North Africa during World War II was the beginning for Professor Nitecki of lifelong interest in and involvement with the people, history, and culture of that continent.

Professor Nitecki later studied law at the Université de Lyon in France and at Oxford University in England and, following his immigration to the United States, he studied English and Art at Wayne State University in Detroit in the early 1950's. He obtained his graduate degree in librarianship at the University of Chicago in 1963.

Most of Professor Nitecki's career was spent in the areas of cataloguing and classification, and in library education. His cataloguing experience included work at the University of Chicago; the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago; the University

of Michigan, where he was Director of Technical Services; and the University of Lagos in Nigeria, where he was chief cataloguer.

Professor Nitecki's career in library education spanned several decades on two continents. In the late 1960's, and early 1970's he lectured at library schools at the University of Ibadan, Nigeria; at the University of Ghana; and at Syracuse University in New York, where he also held an appointment as Art Historian and Curator.

From 1975 to his retirement, Professor Nitecki taught in the (now) School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alberta. Throughout his time at the University, with the exception of leaves to work in Africa, he taught the required beginning course in the organization of knowledge, sharing with his students his extensive background in this area. He also taught a variety of other courses, including those dealing with cataloguing and classification, indexing, collections in the humanities, and comparative librarianship, among others. In addition, he taught courses on African art and culture for both the Department of Anthropology and the Faculty of Extension.

Professor Nitecki's publications

were mainly in the fields of cataloguing and classification and African art. His catalogue of the Andre Nitecki Collection of African Art at the Glenbow Museum in Calgary, where he was an Associate Curator, is in press. One of his postretirement projects was to draw on both his specialties to produce an index to illustrations of African art, and he had begun work on this index when his illness overtook him.

Professor Nitecki had two desires in his final years. One was to create an institute for African art and culture studies at the University of Alberta, and the other was to return to Africa. Both dreams have been realized. The Andre Nitecki African Art and Culture Reading and Resource Room has been established in the Department of Comparative Literature at the University, the initial collection comprising books from Professor Nitecki's large And Professor collections. Nitecki's remains have been buried in Ghana, as per his request.

A memorial service for Professor Andre Nitecki was held on 18 September at the International Centre in HUB on the University campus, and was attended by a large gathering of former students and friends from the library community, and friends from the Edmonton African comm-

unity with whom he had worked for many years.

Proceeds from the Fund will be used to maintain and develop the collections of the Andre Nitecki African Art and Culture Reading and Resource Room on campus.

Three weeks of rain and the ghostly whispers of discontinued Internship programs did not

News from the School ...

The School of Library and Information Studies is pleased to announce that it will be hosting a visit by scholar and author **Roma Harris.** Dr. Harris will be at the School February 7 - 9, 1994.

Or. Harris is an Associate Professor at the School of Library and Information Science at the University of Western Ontario. She has a counselling psychology background. previous articles and areas of research interest have included information technology and the de-skilling of librarians, the information needs of battered women, the information needs of lesbians, sex differences in career development within librarianship, and the influence of gender on perceived competence in reference work. Dr. Harris has presented papers at the annual conferences of both the Canadian Library Association and the American Library Association. Her recently published book, Librarianship: The Erosion of a Women's Profession, has been reviewed as a feminsit analysis which recommends a closer alliance among female professions in order to increase the value which society assigns to "women's work" (Library Journal 18(4), 116). It has been ecommended both to librarians and to women's studies and sociology work programs as a well-written and deeply referenced work (Quill & Quire 59(6), 20).

During her February 1994 visit, Dr. Harris will be presenting a research seminar and lecture to students of the School. Additionally she will be presenting a lecture to members of the Association of Professional Librarians at the University of Alberta (APLUA) and a talk to the members of the Greater Edmonton Library Association (GELA).
